To Head State Legion For Coming Year

A veteran with a thorough knowledge of veterans and civic affairs is the choice of the American Legion, department of Michigan, to head that organization for the 1952-53 year. He is Eugene N. Houck, 45, an insurance executive from Lansing.

The new leader gains the distinction of being the first Legionnaire from the capitol city of Michigan to head the organization in 34 years of American Legion history.

Entering naval service in 1941, Commander Houck distinguished himself as a non-commissioned officer in recreational and physical educational activities centered in eastern seaboard areas.

Born in Albion, Michigan, September 7, 1906, he lived in that city until his senior year of college at which time his family moved to Lansing.

He was graduated from Albion High School in 1925 and from Albion College in 1929 where he was a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity, "A" club, Kappa Nu Epsilon and is now first vice-president of the Alumni association.

Climbing progressively to his present position as Commander of 70,000 Legionnaires in the State of Michigan, Houck first became active in Legion affairs during 1946 and helped organize the Mt. Moriah Post 469 of Lansing, of which he is a member.

The Farmington Township Fire Departments were kept pretty busy during the past week extinguishing a number of minor house and grass fires.

On Friday the Farmington fire department answered a call on Colfax between Farmington Road and Gill to put out a fire in a house. Monday they responded to a fire call at 34415 West Nine Mile Road, where a minor fire was extinguished, in the home of Wayne McBride.

Friday Bell, chief of the Northeast Fire Department, reported one grass fire on Tuesday near Thirteen Mile and Northwestern. Leo Hendryx, Farmington fire chief, stated that in addition to the house and shed fires, a number of calls were received for grass fires.

STRANGE CATCH MADE BY ANGLER IN THUMB AREA STREAM

Strange colored fish, occasionally being taken in a Thumb district stream since last May, have been identified as mutant brook trout.

The identification of these fish with the white-silver to dark blue coloration was made by the University of Michigan Museum, the conservation department's fisheries research institute.

Dr. Reeve M. Bailey, curator of fishes at the museum, and Dr. A. S. Hazzard, institute director, both say they have never encountered similar coloration before.

Of special interest to Michigan fishermen is Hazzard's report that the Wolf Lake state fish hatchery attempts to reproduce the trout. If they should turn out to be a harder or better strain in some way than the regular hatchery product, the mutants conceivably could be used in the department's annual stream stocking program. They also might be used in experimental plantings to determine survival rate of regular hatchery releases.

Name of the Thumb district stream will continue to be withheld until the investigation is completed.

One of the most unusual fish stories of the year got started last May when Thumb district field men began getting persistent reports of albino trout in this small stream. One angler reported catching three adult fish, each about nine inches in length. In fact, William Mason, district fisheries supervisor, relates that this same local angler believes that silver trout have been present for fifteen years.

BOARD TO OPEN BIDS ON TAX NOTE SALE THURSDAY

The Farmington Board of Education will receive and open sealed bids on the sale of \$71,000 in school notes at a special meeting to be held Thursday evening at 8:00 p.m. at the Farmington High School.

Purpose of the sale is to secure money to meet current operation expenses. The notes are being sold in anticipation of tax moneys to be received later from the State. An application for \$60,000 in advanced state aid was filed by the Board late this summer. However, because of a current shortage in the State Treasury, only \$20,000 was allocated.

The tax anticipation notes will be dated October 1, 1952, and will mature on April 1, 1953. They shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed three per cent per annum. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the notes will be considered. The Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids.
