The operation of the machines is very simple and thus eliminates error. The voting procedure is as follows: enter the booth and move the large handle to the right. This closes the curtain behind the voter and clears the machine. On the opposite side of the machine, the voter is to simply turn down the lever over the "yes" or "no" of each question. If the voter wishes to cast a straight party ticket for state and county officers, just pull the large party lever to the right. In voting a split ticket for state and county officers: after you have pulled the party lever, turn up a voting lever over the candidate's name you wish to cut out, and turn a voting lever down over the name of any other candidate for the same office.

Vote the Presidential Ballot by turning down the voting lever over the names of the candidates of your choice. The same procedure is followed in voting the non-party judicial ticket. These ballots are on a separate section of the machine board. When the voting is completed leave the levers down and will open the curtain and record the vote.

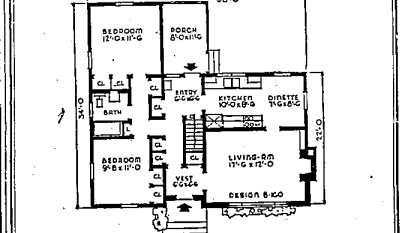
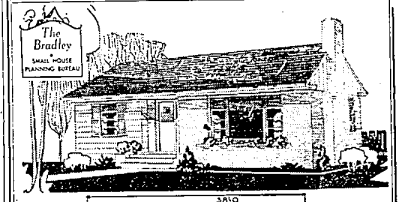
