This is being written Sunday, November 9, and by the time you read it the day will be known as last Sunday. Well, on last Sunday morning I suppose a lot of you awakened and when you got into circulation discovered, as I did, that your garbage can was still unemptied. Then you probably saw the little red tag attached to the can and knew that the collection men had been there.

You read the tag while accumulating a slow burn, and found out that you had "trash in garbage" and that is why they didn't empty the can into the truck. Then you said to yourself, "I didn't have any trash in the garbage — what are they talking about?" Well, I'll try to tell you what they were talking about.

For the last few weeks there have been several articles in The Farmington Enterprise which discussed the hitherto unmentioned problem of the disposal of their rubbish, trash and garbage. The articles revealed that the City Manager had advised the paper that the collectors had complained that the garbage, which was used as livestock feed, had frequently had cans, glass and other solid matter in it. The City Manager said that in the near future the collectors would begin putting a tag on the container belonging to anyone who violated the collection rules.

Of course, if you didn't read those issues of The Enterprise you wouldn't know about the plan. If you did read the articles you'll remember that you were told that garbage which contained solids and paper would not be picked up, I suppose you assumed, just as I did, that you still could put garbage in paper bags or wrap it in paper, as you had been doing for a couple of years.

I personally drove up and down the streets of our area and determined that four out of every five cans had been ticketed, and further determined that most had been ticketed because garbage had been wrapped in paper. Apparently that is what was meant by "trash in garbage".

Frankly, I don't think any of us knew that we shouldn't put in individual bags or bundles, but as I understand from the City Manager, you are expected to use only one or two large paper bags, and to place the bottom of the can with paper. This amount of paper will be acceptable. The City Manager advised me that he would explain in detail in this issue the way you should properly dispose of your garbage. He will also discuss with the collector the matter of replacing the lids of cans after they have been emptied. Also was told that by the time this issue reaches you last Sunday's garbage will have been picked up during a second collection.

Very shortly there will be a door-to-door canvass of this entire city by representatives of the

United Fund and Community Chest. You'll be contacted, so receive the call graciously as they are all volunteer workers, unselfishly contributing their time to a very worthy cause. It is realized that a lot of you already arranged to do your share through the place where you are employed. The object of this local collection door-to-door is to reach those people who are self employed, or who work someplace where a campaign was not held. Do your very best — give generously — and "Give Once For All".
