the Board to review the bids to determine why the classroom unit cost is so much higher on this school as compared to the Lathers Street School. The new grade school is to be built on Osmus just south of Junction Street in Farmington Township. Both the Osmus Street School and Lathers Street building are almost identical in design and construction. Plans for the new Osmus Street School call for eight classrooms. The estimated cost of construction has been set at \$191,587, which includes architects' fees and preliminary expenses.

The architect has been requested to submit a report on the bid costs at the next regular meeting of the Board to be held Thursday evening at the high school.

NEW TOWNSHIP FIRE STATION NEARLY COMPLETED

Work on the new Clarenceville Fire Station is expected to be completed this week end, Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, stated Tuesday.

Some painting and the finishing of the floor is all that remains to complete the building. The new fire station, which is located on Wheeler Street just north of Grand River, was first used Tuesday, November 4, as a polling place for Precinct Two voters. However, this was before the finishing work had been completed. Blanchard added that the new LaFrance Fire Engine is expected to be delivered to the station about December 20. He added, however, that this is an approximate date. The new station has two fire engine stalls as well as a voting room, office, small garage, storage room and boiler room.
