The headline is still true . . it could be run, but these are only Michigan auto accident victims for the year 1951.

Well, this is different, you say? Maybe it is . . . maybe you are one of the dwindling few who have not felt the sorrow and heartache of losing a member of your family or a close friend in an auto accident. You

Important steps have already been taken in the fight against injury and death. Experts from all sections of Michigan have banded together to isolate the causes and work out the cures. Their tools are grim figures, sound recommendations and a real determination. They have seen what other states have done to save lives and have found new purpose from their

Better driver licensing has been one of the principal life-savers in other states. It has not only helped to remove from the highways drivers who are hazards to the life and property of others, but has required greater knowledge of traffic laws and safe driving practices. A single state licensing agency, complete central filing system and more comprehensive drivers' tests are but three of the key recommendations which will save lives. Upon this one foundation rests the effectiveness of all other safety
