An 11 year old bicyclist was killed on Monday, November 24, when his bike was struck by a car driven by Stanley A. Streif, 56, of Walled Lake.

The accident took place near Northwestern Highway and Highway, not far from the home of the boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Konkel.

Young George Konkel was riding his bike on the highway when it was struck from behind. He was one of four children in the Konkel family.

Streif, driver of the car, told State Police that he did not see the bicycle, which had neither tail light nor reflector. The accident occurred at 6:35 p.m.

## STATE SEEKS DATA ON DEER FROM UNIVERSITY

It's good enough for big business it's good enough for the conservation department.

The scientific approach in fact finding, that is.

The department wants to know how many antlerless deer are killed in a single three-day season.

November 28 - 30, and it wants the information in a hurry.

So it is turning to the University of Michigan's survey research center whose services have been used by the Detroit Edison Company only recently.

The research center, in turn, has assigned Dr. Benjamin Teplov on leave from the Bureau of Census, Washington, D. C., to the job of getting the answers for the conservation department.

The center's method involves "sampling" of hunters who will be interviewed personally by department workers during the first week in December.

Teplov says that scientific selection of hunters to be interviewed plus carefully-worded questionnaires will turn up advance data that will be proved amazingly accurate when all returns are in.

With legislative blessing, the department is opening counties in the north half of the lower peninsula to the taking of any deer in the last three days of this month's regular gun season as a means of reducing a herd that has outgrown its natural food supply.

The university's research center engages in fact-finding for both business and government.

## "Singing Cop" To Sing Sunday

Lieutenant Wilbur Legree, a member of the Flint police department for the past 13 years, will appear at the First Baptist Church of Farmington Sunday evening, November 30, at 7:30 in a sacred concert.

Lieutenant Legree at the present time and for the past sixteen years has been in charge of traffic safety for 30,000 youngsters in public and parochial schools in Flint. He has supervision of over 750 safety patrols in their safety activity each day.

Beginning in March, 1943, he directed over 495 consecutive weekly broadcasts over radio station WFDF, Flint, in what is called the "Singing Cop" program. He has appeared on the coast to coast television program, "Lamp Unto My Feet", over the Columbia Broadcasting Company; has broadcast on "We the People", Columbia Broadcasting Network, New York City, and has appeared as a baritone soloist in Flint with the Flint Symphony Orchestra from 1948 through 1951.

During 1951 he appeared in 80 churches giving 90 programs, including primarily sacred concerts. He is the author and compiler of three music books, "Sing with your Singing Cop", "A Book of Songs for the Holiday Season", and "Sweetest Melodies" No. 1 and No. 2.

Being well known in this section of our county, Lieutenant Legree is much talked about and respected.
