Wayne University's combined choral and instrumental organizations will appear in the University's 23rd annual rendition of George F. Handel's oratorio, "The Messiah," at 8:15 p.m. December 16 and 17 in the Masonic Temple auditorium.

Each year the oratorio, Wayne's major musical production of the year, is presented by a chorus of over 500 voices, the University Symphony Orchestra of 75 pieces.

The soloists for this year's performance are Martha Linton, alto; Thelma von Eisenhauer, soprano; Wesley Dalton, tenor; and Kenneth Smith, baritone.

A member of the Metropolitan Opera Company, Miss Linton is a highly sought recital and concert soloist. A prominent radio personality, she has sung on such programs as the Ford Sunday Evening Hour, the Firestone Hour and Let's Go To The Opera. She has received numerous music awards and scholarships.

Mrs. von Eisenhauer is outstanding among sopranos in her sincere interpretations of the solos in the oratorio and has appeared in former Wayne "Messiah" productions. She teaches voice at the Detroit Institute of Musical Arts and is soprano soloist at the Metropolitan Methodist Church.

Wesley Dalton, young tenor soloist, is a native of Dearborn and a former student at Wayne University. Since he made his debut with the New York City Opera as Pinkerton in Puccini's "Madame Butterfly" in 1951, he has been recognized as a singer with a very bright future. Dalton received his vocal training entirely in Detroit. He sang for a season with the Detroit Civic Light Opera Company, later with the Detroit Opera Society, and was district contest winner of the Metropolitan Opera Auditions of the Air in 1951.

Baritone soloist Kenneth Smith is a popular concert artist. He has appeared in six operas on the NBC-TV Opera Theatre, and has sung many successful engagements with the Rhode Island Philharmonic, the Little Orchestra Society, and the Buffalo Philharmonic. He appeared in the role of Frank in "Die Fledermaus" at the Montreal Festival and has sung in the New York Stadium Concerts. Galleries Feature Matisse, Berman

Two exhibitions opened simultaneously on December 2 in the Print Department galleries of the Detroit Institute of Arts and will run through February 15.

The first consists of thirty prints by the great contemporary French painter, Henri Matisse, all executed during the past 15 years and which are presented to the museum collection as the gift of John S. Newberry, Jr., the museum's curator of graphic arts.

Employing four different techniques, etching, lithography, aquatint and linocut, these prints were issued in a limited edition of 25 impressions each, numbered and signed by the artist.

Among the group, a rare lithographed Self-Portrait of the artist is the only impression of this print so far to have come to this side of the Atlantic Ocean. In subject matter, the prints are chiefly devoted to a series of portraits heads in a variety of graceful attitudes ranging from delicate, small etchings through large lithographs to bold, monumental aquatints.

The second exhibition in the Print galleries is a selection of cameos and stage designs by Eugene Berman, recently commissioned by him for new productions at the Metropolitan Opera in New York. Of Verdi's "Rigoletto" and "La Traviata" and of Wagner's "Die Walkure" which opened this year's opera season at the Metropolitan. These were lent by M. Knoedler and Company of New York.

DECEMBER SAFETY IS STRESSED BY STATE POLICE

Sergeant Henry P. Kozowicz, commander of the Detroit State Police Post, is reminding motorists and pedestrians that December is not only a happy, but also an extremely hazardous holiday month.

Because of this police agencies throughout the state are taking part in a special safety campaign emphasizing the importance of extra caution.

"A deadly combination of traffic hazards," Sergeant Kozowicz said, "makes walking and driving particularly dangerous. In fact, with the unfavorable weather, longer periods of darkness and the general holiday rush and celebrating December is regarded as one of the deadliest months of the year. On the basis of miles traveled, it is definitely the deadliest.

During the past five years nearly 82,000 December traffic accidents have occurred in Michigan. They resulted in 742 deaths and 18,273 injuries.

"While there is nothing anyone can do to prevent unfavorable weather or darkness, everyone can avoid being careless if they really try. When walking or driving, allowances should be made for prevailing conditions. Alertness can prevent many tragedies.

"The fact that December should be the happiest, not the deadliest month of the year should cause everyone to work hard at making the holiday season safer for all."
