Doctor Tells Of Polio Gains

More progress has been made in the last two years by scientists working under grants from the March of Dimes than during the ten preceding years. Dr. Joseph C. Molner, Detroit's Health Commissioner said last week.

Dr. Molner attended the American Public Health Association meeting, recently held in Cleveland, at which reports were made on the March of Dimes gamma globulin field tests as well as on the experimental polio vaccine.

"It is significant of the great progress made by scientific researchers that test-tube victories now presage the coming of a direct and specific attack upon paralytic poliomyelitis in man himself. The 15 years' fight against polio, conducted quietly in laboratories and research centers, is emerging into the open. More than 8 millions of dollars of the March of Dimes funds have been expended toward the final conquest of the disease," Dr. Molner said.

Pointing out that scientists at Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health, working for years under March of Dimes grants, have developed a vaccine for gift for a veteran which will be taken over to Maybury the following week.

Following the business meeting the hostesses, Mrs. Kjonig Jonen and Mrs. Arden Colborn, served refreshments.

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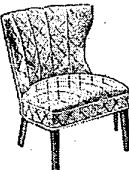
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
