### Seek New Legislation To Strengthen State Law Enforcement Agencies

Renewed effort to obtain passage of legislation to strengthen law enforcement agencies failed at the last session of the legislature. It was decided to propose regulations requiring that a record be made of dynamite sales if an examination of present law shows that this is not covered.

The committee will ask the state bar association to study legislation to provide for the proper disposition of cases of juvenile licensed driver offenders under 17 years of age, as this now presents a problem.

A recommendation of the safety and traffic committee of the Michigan association of chiefs of police that a re-study be made to provide a more effective means of handling cases in which drivers fail to respond to traffic summons also was endorsed.

### OFFICIALS EXPECT RECORD TAKE OF BEAR THIS YEAR

Final totals of game carried by hunters over the Straits indicate Michigan will probably register a record take of bear in 1952.

Reports received by the conservation department show 406 bear crossed on Straits ferries, by far the highest number taken in recent years.

Straits figures reflect the total kill for any year. Last year, 216 bear were carried over the Straits; total kill for the year was computed at 1,118. In 1950, the total carried over the Straits. Hunters received 466 permits to take deer through Wisconsin and Five deer were carried south on the Ann Arbor ferry. During the special "any deer" season, 28 does and fawns were taken north across the Straits.

### CARE OFFSETS LICE LOSSES

Methoxychlor spray is the best means of fighting lice that cut milk production and cause other losses in dairy herds, advises Donald L. Murray, Michigan State College extension dairyman. If dairymen fear for cattle sprayed in cold weather, he suggests clipping the animals and then dusting on methoxychlor powder.



### ADVISE CARE IN HANDLING SECURITY ACCOUNT

"Only one social security account number is needed for a worker's lifetime," says Rex A. C. Atwood, manager of the Pontiac office of the Social Security Administration. If you have more than one number, it is likely that wages or self-employment income are being, or have been, credited to more than one account and, as a result, when you retire, or at your death, the full amount of benefits otherwise due may not be payable, he continued.

In an effort to prevent the issuance of more than one account number, employers and the self-employed are occasionally inconvenienced. With few exceptions, any person 21 years of age or over who applies for an original account number card, is asked to wait a week or so while the application is checked against our Central Office records in Baltimore, Maryland. In this way and in this way only — can we be absolutely certain that we are not issuing a second number to a worker, he said. Atwood requested the indulgence of account number applicants.

He stressed that an individual should not delay in applying for either an original or duplicate card because of the time lag. "Get your card in time," Atwood cautioned. "Most employers insist upon seeing your card before putting you on their payroll. Each day you wait may cost you a day's pay," he concluded, "so save time and money by getting your card early enough so you will have it when you need it most."

And to save possible inconvenience in the future due to a lost social security card, Atwood suggested keeping the stub of the card in a safe place.
