LIBRARY RECEIVES FIRST PAYMENT ON STATE GRANT

A check for \$541.96 has been received from the Michigan State Board for Libraries which is the first payment of a grant from the General Library Fund. This was made possible since the appropriations from both the township and city were furnished.

The final payment will be made sometime before July 1, 1953. It is estimated that the per capita grant this year will be approximately six cents. This is based on the 1950 census.

As the result of the increase in funds, the number of hours per week has been extended from 29 hours to 35 hours. The new hours are as follows:

Monday and Thursday, 4:00 to 9:00 p.m. Wednesday and Saturday, 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and from 4:00 to 8:00 p.m. Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

In approximate order of popularity, these are the balsam fir, white spruce, Norway spruce, black spruce, Douglas fir, Colorado blue spruce, Scotch (Scots) pine, red pine, Austrian pine, white pine, Jack pine, eastern hemlock and white cedar.

The work covers engineering, patching, dragging, dust laying, shoulder and side approaches, drainage, traffic service and snow removal. The township has advanced the county \$500 to help cover expenses until the 1953 budget has been approved.

Blanchard announced at the meeting that six volunteer firemen have been lined up for duty and six for night duty at the new Clarenceville fire station.
