Trojan Five Loses Heartbreaker To Brighton, 50-47 December 12

The Clarenceville Trojan basketball team bowed to Brighton 50-47 Friday, December 12. This game marked the third consecutive loss of the current season for the Trojans, was a heartbreaker for Clarenceville. This close, exciting, hard fought game was not decided until this last minute, when Brighton was able to push across two quick baskets.

The Trojans showed great form in the early stages of the game as their defense and offense brilliantly outshined Brighton. The Trojans' tight zone defense, along with sparkling rebounding on the part of Koch, Merlans and Evans, helped them greatly to get off to a 24-17 half-time lead. Rutlla, playing a great game, sparked the Trojan offense in the first half as he tipped in nine tallies to lead the scoring attack. Koch, the Trojan rebounding ace, rang up six more of the tallies. Rounding out the scoring for the first half were Evans with 4; Merlans with 3 and Killeen with 2 points.

The Trojans barely outscored Brighton in the first period as they managed to take a slim 12-10 margin at the end of the first quarter. However, the Trojans racked up 13 points in the second period while holding Brighton to seven points to take a seven-point lead at the half.

The Trojan chances for a victory were altered late in the second quarter when Koch suffered a recurrence of a knee injury. Koch re-entered the game midway in the third period, but was badly handicapped by his injury and was unable to maintain the sparkling form he had shown earlier.

At Brighton's 35-35 at the end of the third quarter as they racked up 17 points while holding Clarenceville to eleven.

The final period proved to be exciting and close as the lead kept changing hands. Killeen, Merlans and Myers, playing great ball throughout the game, kept the Trojans in the running in the last period by scoring four points each. The game was not decided until the final minutes when Brighton sank two quick baskets to take a four-point lead with only seconds left to be played. Brighton outscored Clarenceville by three points in the last quarter, and this proved to be a big enough margin for them to gain a victory. The final score was 50-47.

Tom Rutlla showed brilliant form as he sparked the Trojan offense with 13 points to take high point honors. Jim Merlans also playing great ball, was right behind Rutlla with ten points to his credit. Myers, Killeen, Evans and Koch rounded out the scoring for C. H. S. with six tallies each.

RESEARCH GROUP INCLUDES TEACHER FROM FARMINGTON

Three years of concentrated study and research in the field of science education was culminated Monday, December 29, in St. Louis, Missouri, for a dozen graduate students from Western Michigan College and their director, Dr. George S. Mallison.

Included in the group of students is Miss Jacqueline V. Buck, a science teacher at Farmington High School. Her study was made of "Analysis of the Scores Obtained on the Test Items".

Miss Buck, a graduate of Kalamazoo College and the University of Michigan, is now studying for her Ph. D. degree at the University of Michigan. She resides at 593 Townsend Street, Birmingham.

Before the science education section of the American Association for the Advancement of Science these students placed their 85-page report, the results of some 20,000 man hours of labor in checking the regents' examinations in science given three times yearly to New York state high school seniors.

Since 1875 the regents' examinations have been a part of the educational pattern for New York schools, yet this is the first exhaustive test ever conducted of any portion of the testing program.

After the tests have been under fire by small groups, but never before has any segment been dissected completely by an exhaustive research.

Since December of 1948 the group has pored over more than two tons of forms, noting over three and one-half million entries on forms and tally sheets to check the results of the examinations in chemistry, physics, biology and earth science. Last year at the AAAS meeting, the group decided to devote its program this year to one long report rather than many short ones and chose the Western Michigan College project for its new departure.

Despite the filing of this report, the results are not yet ready for publication.
