Court Rules Against Motorboat Regulations

Clare County circuit court decided recently that municipalities along lakes "could not impose new or greater regulations on motorboats," according to Nicholas V. Olds, assistant attorney general assigned to the conservation department.

In effect, this means cities on lakes cannot command boat owners to pay fees or obtain permits for operation of boats on those waters.

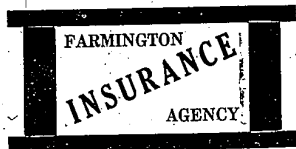
The issue came to a head in the test case of Delroy Franks vs. the City of Harrison. Harrison officials passed an ordinance regulating boats on adjoining Budd Lake, but the court decided against the ordinance.

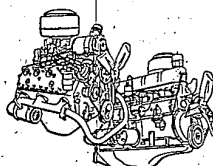

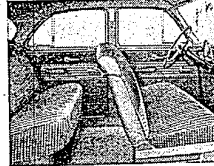
