DR. FRANK ADAMS TO PRESENT THREE DRAMATIC RECITALS

"Religion over the Footlights", a series of three interpretive, dramatic recitals, will be given in the next three months by Dr. Frank D. Adams at Sunday resper services in the Farmington Universalist Church.

Each of the recitals will deal with a celebrated drama of the first half of this century. All these plays have definitely religious themes, but the interpretations will contain no doctrine or controversial matter and will be open to the public.

After an introductory sketch of the setting and situation, Dr. Adams will recite, verbatim, speeches of the principal characters, conducting the audience through the play as if it were being presented on a stage.

Recitals of this type are no new thing for Dr. Adams. His attracted wide recognition through similar presentations at the Church of Our Father in Westland and in other parts of the United States before he began his permanent pastorate in Farmington. His remarkable memory and forceful delivery, especially of poetic passages, have been widely acclaimed.

"The Servant in the House", the famous drama of social reform first presented in 1908, will be the subject of the first recital on January 25.

"Outward Bound", described by Dumas Maistre as the most provocative play of 1922, will be recited on February 22.

"Death Takes A Holiday", adapted by Walter Ferris from the Italian of Alberto Camella into a top-notch performance of 1929-30, will be given on March 22.

Each program will begin at 7:30 p.m., starting with a brief organ concert and special music. Tea will follow the dramatic recital. No admission will be charged, but an offering will be taken.

The recitals are a prelude to the 19th anniversary of the founding of the Farmington church which will be celebrated next fall.

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
