The ship left from West Coast ports on January 5. The two-week operation was broken by a visit to San Francisco, California, on January 10 and 11.

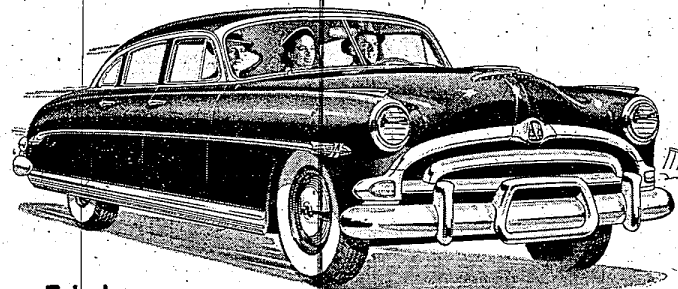

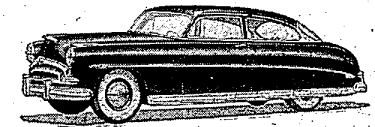
