LOSS OF DEER FROM STARVATION LESS THIS YEAR

Deer losses to starvation may be only slight this year, a glance at the snow gauge indicates. To date, snow on Michigan's deer range have been comparatively light, and in many places conservation department observers report deer still browsing the uplands, with acorns providing an important source of food.

Generally, by late December, there is little snow or clearing in their way to winter quarters. Deer go into yards, or swamp areas, during the winter for protection from storms and because of food supplies.

However, Michigan's over-sized deer herd has in recent years been eating itself out of house and home. Food growth in the swamp areas is dangerously over-eaten, and some starvation this year seems inevitable. The special "any deer" season this fall checked the problem to some extent. Observers will have to wait until the critical spring starvation period to learn just how much good the season did.

But the longer the herd can stay out of yards this winter the better. Game men say each additional day without snow helps.

As a general rule, the northern lower peninsula herd will yard when a foot of snow covers its range. In the upper peninsula, deer yard when snow reached 18 inches in depth.

Department observers report enough snow in the Gaylord area at present and deer moving into swamps. In most other areas of the northern lower peninsula deer are reported drifting only slowly toward swamps. In the upper peninsula, deer are in the vicinity of swamps in only a few places, though a sudden snow could change this picture quickly.

Color Map of Indian Lake Ready For Distribution

A color map of Indian Lake, in Schoolcraft County, is now complete and may be had by writing the fish and game division, conservation department to Lansing.

The Indian Lake map is the third in the atlas series of Michigan lakes. Higgins Lake, Roscon County, and Lake Huron, Kalamazoo County, were the first completed. Two others are presently being processed and will be available in the near future.

The map shows contours, water depth, shore installations, locations of weed beds and bottom compositions. On the reverse side are listed specific biological, geographical, biological and other physical characteristics of the mapped lakes as well as more general information concerning Michigan lakes, their productivity and make-up.

STATE CONSIDERS NEW HUNT LAWS FOR NEXT SEASON

Probably the biggest question in the minds of Michigan's avid deer hunters is: "What will deer regulations be for 1953?"

Conservation department game men say the answer to that depends on a number of things that haven't happened yet: Severity of the winter, date of the spring break-up and extent of the spring fawn crop are all factors that will play important roles in the problem.

Deer regulations must fit conditions in the field, as shown by the latest and most complete information that can be had.

"We have much work ahead of us in finding answers to these problems," says Don Douglas, in charge of the game division's technical and advisory staff. During the coming months, winter deer herds, herd health and positions must all be checked closely and the information summarized before a set of regulations for 1953 can be recommended to the conservation commission.

Chasing the varied regulations used by other states in managing their herds, Douglas says only time will tell where and when Michigan must harvest more or fewer bucks, does or fawns.

"Perhaps we will need a simple buck law in some areas. Perhaps an antlerless regulation or another 'any deer' season will be needed," Douglas adds.

The guiding principle, he notes, is to harvest where necessary so herd numbers and food supplies balance out. The herd grows physically while trees and shrubs that serve as deer food are given a chance to grow back and serve as the next year's food supply.

Council would cooperate wherever possible.

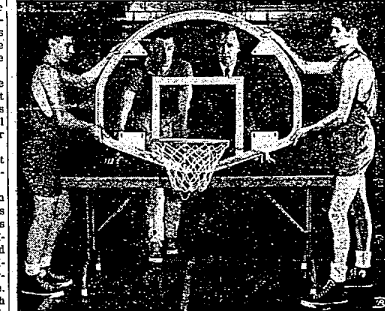

New Fan-Shaped Glass Backboards



The new fan-shaped basketball backboards made of Herculite will provide greater free visual area for spectators.

Development of the fan-shaped glass backboard came as a result of scientific measurement of places hit by a basketball. The study revealed that the important area is in the shape of a fan or kidney, which eliminated the necessity of a four by six foot rectangular backboard. This latter type has been mandatory on recommendation of the Association of College Basketball Coaches. Fan-shaped backboards already have been adopted by the National Basketball Committee and have gained in popularity with high schools and secondary schools.

Long vigorous tests under actual playing conditions have shown that 3-inch Herculite is four to five times stronger than ordinary glass of the same thickness.
