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## FALCONS DROP LEAGUE GAME TO KEEGO, 43-40

Lack of scoring in the third period proved to be the downfall of the Farmington Falcons as they lost to Keego Harbor, 43 to 40, in the league game Friday, January 16, at the Farmington floor, as an interlakes League game.

Starting line-up in Friday's game was J. Rice and W. Dryden at forward; D. Oamus and D. T. M. at guard and D. T. M. at center.

Keego jumped to an early two-point lead that was overtaken by Farmington on baskets by Tyler and Rice, with four points.

Tyler, with three, Mantel with three and Oamus and Dryden with one each accounted for the Falcons 12 to 9 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Midway in the second quarter the Falcons showed their best punch of the game as they spurred to an eight point lead. Tyler added four points to his total, along with four by Stumback, while Mantel and Dryden brought the score to 24-17 at halftime.

Keego held the Falcons to only three buckets in the third quarter as they closed the lead to three points. Farmington couldn't get enough shots at the basket and had trouble gaining possession.

Pat, Rice and Cowart accounted for the three baskets that enabled the Falcons to have a slim 32 to 29 lead at the end of the period.

Keego led the score early in the final quarter and surged into a four-point lead. Farmington's best shot to steal the ball from Keego's stalling tactics were ineffective. Tyler, Dryden, Mantel and Oamus had four, three, two and one point respectively in the fourth quarter.

The loss was the Falcons' second straight and leaves them with a three-one record in Interlakes League play.

Farmington will attempt to rebound to the win column against Southfield on Thursday, January 22. The game originally was scheduled at Farmington, but has been moved to Southfield on January 22 but has been switched to Farmington because Southfield's gym has not been completed.

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## Northville Five Defeats Trojans

The Clarencville Trojan basketball team failed in an effort to break into the win column in the league standings as they were downed by a strong Northville five 43 to 35 on Friday, January 16. This marked the fourth consecutive defeat and the sixth loss of the current season in seven starts for the Trojans.

Northville, who remained undefeated in league competition, got off to an early lead, which they had little trouble preserving during the game.

Northville tallied 15 points in the first period, while holding Clarencville to 8 points. The Trojans held Northville's attack in check in the second period, as they scored 13 points while holding their rivals to 12 points.

Northville led the scoring drive for Clarencville in this period with five buckets. The score at intermission being 27 to 21 in Northville's favor.

In the third period Clarencville's scoring threats died off again as Northville held them to 8 points. Northville racked up 12 points in this period to increase their lead to 39-23 at the end of the third quarter mark.

The fourth period proved fatal for the Trojans, as Northville fed the game by scoring 15 times while holding Clarencville to 4 more points. The final score was 54 to 35.

Bob Townsley led the Trojan attack with 12 tallies. Bill Myers was second with 8 and Tom Rutka and Pat Killen were tied with four points each. Kosh with two, Robbins with two, Peace and Phillips with one each rounded out the Trojan scoring.

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## RESEARCH PROJECT ON LAKES, RIVERS STARTED IN 1952

A ten-year study of Michigan lakes and river systems, first major research project financed with U. S. Dinsell-Johnson funds, was started. Some 60 lakes and river systems were on the first year investigation schedule. While this and other types of fisheries work have been carried on by the department of conservation for a long time, return of rod and reel tax money will speed up the pace.

With the experimental Riffe River watershed improvement project nearing completion, the department commenced work on the Pine River system overhaul project in Oscoda, Lake, Westport and Manistee Counties. Little is believed to be the largest restoration project of its type in the nation. Objectives are restoring fish habitat, curbing soil erosion and providing other benefits.

Research was under way on natural lake fertilization methods with the plan being to find ways of increasing fish production in low lake levels.

Hatchery crews again released a large number of legal-size brook brown, rainbow and lake trout, 1,284,000 as compared to 1,301,000 the year before.

When final commercial fishermen's reports are tabulated, figures may show the annual haul from Michigan portions of the Great Lakes to be close to an average of 25,000,000 pounds this year.

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## J.V.'s Take Keego Harbor For Fourth Straight Win

Sparked by John McCaffrey's 17 points, the Falcons J. V. team took Keego Harbor 44 to 35 on the home court, Friday, January 16.

Leading 23 to 19 at the half, Farmington was never in trouble during the rest of the game.
