The Trojan five started the mighty Falcons as they outplayed them throughout the game with great defensive and offensive maneuvering.

The Trojans, sparked by Rutla, Myers, Townsend, Killen, Robbins, Phillips, Merlans, Koch and Vanderburgh, overwhelmed the Falcons, who had previously shown good form against the high school and out-maneuvering them on many occasions.

Clarenceville surprised the Falcons as they constantly thwarted their scoring drives, and outplayed them nicely under the basket, as they recovered rebounds time and time again.

The Falcons, who are noted throughout the state for their basketball abilities, showed good form in the early stages of the first period as they staged a scoring attack that netted them a 7-point lead. However, their lead was short-lived, as the Trojans in the fourth quarter proved the margin of victory for Clarenceville as they tallied 17 times while holding the Falcons to a mere seven points to gain a 46-41 upset.

Rutla and Evans showed dazzling form as they racked up 10 points each to lead the scoring attack for Clarenceville. Myers also showed great skill by adding another 9 points to take second in the scoring honors. Townsend, a center, notched 7 points. Also playing outstanding basketball was Killen (5), Robbins (3), and Vanderburgh (2).

This surprise victory over the Falcons raised Clarenceville's season record to 3 wins and 6 losses.

The Trojans, now fired up, did not give any ground to their opponents in the second period as they matched the Falcons basket for basket.
