S. choice beef is 1 pound or sirloin fer 89c a lb. and the ground beef is 3 lbs. fer \$1.39. Then we have some boneless veal rolls fer 59c a lb. and some ribbed pork loin roasts fer 39c a lb. Somethin' else, too — we sure were surprised at the number of people that are really interested in our "Food Club Plan". To those who already have a locker or a home freezer unit we thought long about now it might be gettin' empty and yuh'd like to fill 'em. Here are today's prices on some meat. Yuh can git a side of Government graded U. S. choice beef fer 49c a lb. A hind quarter is 59c a lb. or a whole pork loin fer 45c a lb. Now this can be cut, wrapped, and sharp frozen, ready fer yer home unit. If yuh want it properly wrapped in a double locker paper it'll cost yuh 4c a lb. — and if yuh want it was dipped in Thermo-plastic wax that'll be 5c a lb. If yuh don't know what we're talkin' about, stop in and we'll be glad to explain the whole kit and kaboodle to yuh. If yer really interested don't put this off cause we don't know how long these prices will be good fer.
