

FALCONS BEAT WATERFORD 56-37; TROJANS DOWN MILFORD FIVE

F. H. S. Regains Victory Column

The Farmington Falcons basketball team broke a four-game losing streak as they bounced back into the win column with a 56-37 victory over Waterford. The game, played on the Waterford floor on February 13, was the Falcons' second victory over Waterford this year.

The Falcons jumped into an early lead in the first quarter on baskets by Jerry Rice and Dick Tyler. At the end of the first quarter Farmington led 14-8. Early in the second quarter Waterford changed to a zone defense to stop Rice and Tyler cutting across in front of the basket. Successive long shots by Wayne Dryden and Werner Maki threatened to break the zone, but Waterford stopped the Falcon threat and proceeded to rally to a 35-23 halftime lead.

The third period was a different story with Farmington forging ahead into a 35-30 lead. The Falcons took the play away from Waterford on the boards and outscored their opponents.

In the fourth quarter Farmington pulled away on baskets by Tyler, Mansfield and Rice. Numerous fouls were called in the last three minutes and Farmington took advantage of the charity tosses. B. Spiller, D. Osmus and P. Lemon connected on foul shots. Jerry Rice set the pace for Farmington in the scoring department with 18 points; Dick Tyler followed with 12 points. The season record for Farmington is six wins and seven losses.

C.H.S. Scores 42-37 Victory

Notching their second successive league victory in as many weeks, the Clarenceville Trojans upset a highly regarded Milford 42-37 in a very close, exciting, last-quarter contest. This impressive victory dimmed Milford's hopes for retaining first place in the W. O. C. league standings. The Trojan victory enabled them to move up into a tie for third place with Clarkson in league standing.

The Trojan quietest, showing brilliant rebounding and defensive work overpowered the favored Redskins throughout the game to take their third victory of the current season.

The first half featured outstanding defensive ball on the part of both teams, resulting in a close but low-scoring sixteen minutes. Townsend took the defensive spotlight for the Trojans, as he showed excellent rebounding play. Townsend also led the offense as he racked up nine tallies to take high point honors for this week. Evans, Killeen and Ruttle also brilliantly added the Trojan scoring thrust as they scored seven points each. Ruttle now has a 133 season point total for a 10.2 point per game average to lead the Trojan scorers for the current season.

In the first period the Trojans tallied only eight times while holding the Redskins to a mere six points. The second period took on the same low-scoring pattern, as the Trojans were able to seven points while Milford notched eight tallies to boost the scoreboard to a slim 15-14 margin in Clarenceville's favor.

The Trojans were able to increase their lead to a mere three points at the end of the three-quarter mark as they outshot their opponents 12 points to ten. The score at the end of the third period was 27-24.

Milford fought grimly to overtake the Trojans in the dramatic final lap of the game, but their hopes faded as the Trojans outscored them once again, 15-13, in what proved to be the high-scoring period of the game. The final tally found the Trojans handing Milford their third loss of the season by the tune of 42-37.

Those aiding in Clarenceville's scoring drive, other than Townsend, were Phillips with 4, Koeh and Robbins with 3 each and Myers with two points.

Clarenceville will venture to Norville in another league game on Friday, February 20. The Trojans will be fighting to move up in the league standings as they encounter the second place, Mustangs.

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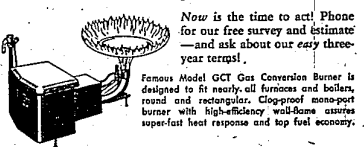
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
