

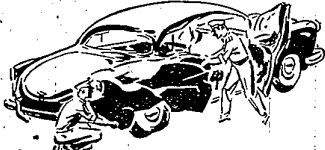
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REGISTRATION NOTICE FOR GENERAL ELECTION TO BE HELD

SCOTS TO HONOR IMMORTAL BARD AT CONCERT, DANCE

The St. Andrew's Society of Detroit, on Saturday, February 21, 1953, at 8:00 p.m., at the St. Andrew's Hall at 431 E. Congress, will present its 104th Robert Burns Concert and Ball. This will celebrate the 193rd anniversary of the birth of the immortal Scottish Bard.

The headline of the program will be beautiful twenty-three year old Margo MacKinnon, singing in Detroit for the first time. She has sung as soloist with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, and last year won the Kiwanis Rose Bowl Music Festival competition in Toronto.

Thomas Cole, lyric tenor, a newcomer to Detroit, is a graduate of Columbia University Music School and has appeared on TV and the radio.

An unusually fine comedy team, Al Verdi and Dolores, will be on hand.

Wee Tommy Barr, a thirteen year old grandson of St. Andrew's Society piping school, will make his first public appearance.

Pearl Smith's troop of Highland dancers will present the old Scottish dances, and a new one called the Scottish Tap.

The Detroit Highlanders pipe band, twelve strong, will be on hand to blow the roof off the building.

Following the concert there will be old Scottish dancing, including country dancing, and modern dancing for the not-so-energetic. Tickets to the concert and ball may be had at St. Andrew's Hall, 431 E. Congress, Detroit 25.

Dr. Frank D. Adams To Present Recitation Of Famous Play Sunday

An interpretive recital of "Outward Bound," the celebrated drama by Sutton Vane, will be given at 4:30 p.m. Sunday, February 22, in the Farmington Universalist Church by Dr. Frank D. Adams, the pastor.

"Outward Bound," described by Burns Mantle as the most provocative play of 1923, revolves about the death and the after-life. It is notable for its poetic and reflective qualities.

This is the second of a series of dramatic recitals titled "Religion Over the Footlights." The concluding recital will be that of "Death Takes a Holiday" on March 23.

Special music for this Sunday's recital will be provided by Evelyn Adams Castello, organist, and Janet H. Blumenthal, Detroit violinist.

Miss Blumenthal will play Pietro Nardali's "Concerto in E Minor," allegro moderato, andante Cantabile and allegretto giocoso. Mrs. Castello will play the theme from Jean Sibelius' "Finlandia" and, as a hymn theme, "My Faith Looks Up to Thee."

An informal reception, at which time, coffee and light refreshments will be served, will be held in Adams Hall of the church after the recital. Hosts and hostesses for the program will be Mr. and Mrs. Max Hulett and Mr. and Mrs. George A. Leonard.

The program will contain no doctrinal or controversial matter and is open to the public. No admission will be charged, but a free-will offering will be received.

PONTIAC TEACHER GETS SCHOLARSHIP IN CONSERVATION

Miss Sally Adams, audio-visual aids teacher at Pontiac High School, was recently awarded the first conservation scholarship for 1953, the conservation department reports.

The General Richardson chapter of the DAR made the award entitling Miss Adams to a week's conservation training at one of three sessions at the department's Higgins Lake Training School this summer.

Last summer, 143 school teachers from all parts of the state attended the sessions. This year the department expects 175 to 200 to take advantage of the program, now in its seventh year.

Individual garden clubs, sportsmen's clubs and women's groups pay fees for one or more teachers from their area to attend the Higgins Lake sessions. Teachers put the training to work in hometown classrooms.

This next summer the three sessions will run from July 12 to 18, July 26 to August 1 and August 23 to 29.

The department provides information to sponsoring clubs and carries out the teaching program. Field trips, discussions and lectures by authorities in various fields of conservation make up the week-long sessions.

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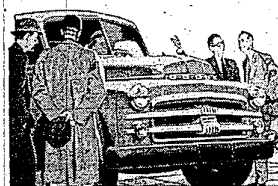
