

Coming Up This Summer

Meadow Brook's 10th Season Opens June 28

ROCHESTER
For its gala 10th anniversary season, the Meadow Brook Musical Festival will have a classical series with an exciting international scope.

Conductors from The Netherlands, Poland, Japan, England, Italy and Sweden will take the podium in an unusual "Festival of Conductors."

It will include the American orchestral debut of the brilliant young Polish composer Kazimierz Kord, plus an appearance by Edo de Waart, young conductor from The Netherlands, whose "Flying Dutchman" has won accolades in the U.S.

There will be guest artists of Rumanian, French and Italian heritage, as well as some of America's most prestigious musicians.

The Meadow Brook Music Festival, the summer home of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, will run for eight weeks, from June 28 to Aug. 19, with Thursday and Saturday evenings again given over the classical concerts.

Swedish-born Sixten Ehrling, who has conducted at Meadow Brook since its inception in 1964 and who has been named to head the orchestral department of the Juilliard School, will conduct the orchestra for the first two weeks of the series.

Italian conductor, Aldo Ceccato, the Detroit sym-

phony's conductor - designate, will conduct for the first time at Meadow Brook on July 26 and 28.

The setting for the festival is the beautiful outdoor Baldwin Pavilion in the hills of Rochester.

Van Cliburn will open the festival on Thursday, June 28. He will play again on Saturday, June 30.

The July 5 and 7 concerts will star the exciting husband and wife operatic team, James McCracken, tenor, and Sandra Warfield, mezzo-soprano.

Andre Previn, whose concerts at Meadow Brook in 1970 and 1971 were among the most successful in the festival's history, will return again July 12 and 14. The soloist will be the American pianist, John Borwning.

The National Ballet of Washington will be featured on Thursday, Saturday and Sunday nights, July 19, 21 and 22. The company has staged luminous new productions of "Cinderella" and "Sleeping Beauty." George Balanchine is the artistic adviser.

Ceccato's Meadow Brook appearances will star young and brilliant artists also new to the pavilion.

Lawrence Foster, the teenage cellist, will play July 26. The 27-year-old Rumanian pianist, Radu Lupu, will perform July 28.

De Waart will be featured Aug. 2 and 4, with violinist Ruggiero Ricci as guest artist.

Kord will make his American debut at Meadow Brook on Aug. 9 and 11. Appearing with him will be pianist Misha Dichter.

The classical concert series will conclude with appearances of Hirokuki Iwaki, noted Japanese conductor, and Phillippe Entremont, pianist, on Aug. 16 and 18.

In addition to the classical series, the festival will feature the popular Sunday symphony "pops" concerts, a jazz series on Friday evenings and a special events series on Wednesday evenings. Artists and schedules will be released in the near future.

Ann Arbor Fair To Be July 18-21

The 14th annual Ann Arbor street art fair will be held July 18-21 on S. University.

The fair annually attracts more than 100,000 persons who come to see and buy the works of nearly 300 artists.

It is sponsored by the South University Businessmen's Assn., the Ann Arbor Art Assn., the Chamber of Commerce and the University of Michigan.

The jury systems was instituted in 1965. An acceptance committee, made up of at least eight persons competent to evaluate one or more categories of the fair, is responsible for the selection of accepted artists and the issuance of invitations. The series will run for eight weeks, July 1 through Aug. 19, in Oakland University's Baldwin Pavilion.


Other highlights will be a performance by the National Ballet, an all-Gershwin evening featuring Andre Kostelanetz and Leonard Pen-nario and a Spanish-inspired musical evening with

Morton Gould and Carlos Montoya.

Sixten Ehrling will lead the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in the as yet untitled Nero work. Nero and his Trio will play during the second half of the concert.

Arthur Fiedler will appear on July 8, to conduct the Detroit Symphony in a program of pop favorites. His guest artist will be the young Latin American pianist, Alegria Arce.

The all-Gershwin evening is set for July 15, and on July 22, the National Ballet of Washington, D.C., will present "Cinderella."
