

MUSTANGS DUMP TROJANS, 44-42; FALCONS THIRD IN LEAGUE PLAY

Rutilla Paces Team With 18 Points

The Clarencville Trojans were downed by the Northville Mustangs in another close, hard-fought game by the tune of 44-42 Friday, February 26. The thrilling game, which was played on the small Northville home floor, found the Trojans staging a brilliant comeback in the last half after getting off to a poor start. The Trojans' guard, Tom Rutilla, once again sparked the offensive unit as he racked up an amazing 18 points to boost his season's total to 153 tallies for a 10.9 per game average.

The Trojans played good ball throughout the first period, as they tallied 11 times while their opponents managed to score 13 points in the period to lead by a mere two points. Rutilla featured the scoring attack as he racked up 8 of the 11 points.

The second period proved fatal to the Trojans, as their attack cooled down. The Trojans were held to a slim four points in this period as the Mustangs tallied 14 times to take a 27-15 lead at intermission time.

Clarencville began to avenge the Mustang lead in the third period, as they notched 11 points to Northville's 9, to make the score 36-25 at the three-quarter mark.

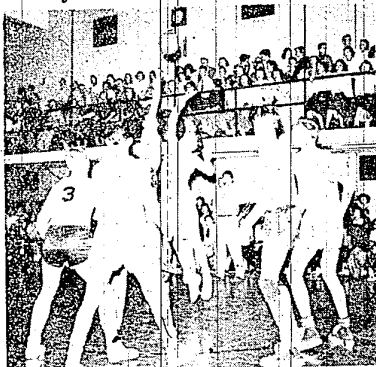
The Trojans staged an impressive 16 point attack in the final period, to come within two points of Northville as the final buzzer sounded. Clarencville's seize for victory was highlighted by superior defense play in the part of the Trojans five. Northville's quietest was held to eight tallies in this period. The final tally on the scoreboard found the Trojans lacking two points, as Northville was able to preserve a victory by the score of 44-42.

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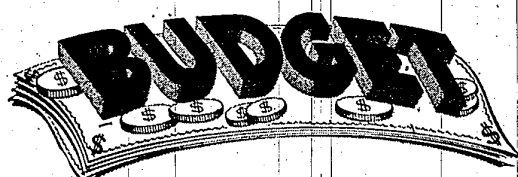


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
