Conservation COM. SETS POLICY FOR OUTSIDE JOBS

Conservation department employees now know where they stand regarding outside employment.

The conservation department, in a recent meeting in Lansing, authorized a policy for outside employment of department personnel designed to judge each case on its merits.

In general, commissioners agree that employees had the right to outside employment, especially in some of the lower-salaried positions.

"We recognize the employee's right," states the policy, "to engage in outside activities which do not interfere with department jobs or reflect unfavorably upon the department."

After March 15, at which date the policy becomes effective, any employee having outside employment must receive permission from his immediate superior. In most cases this will mean simple approval. In marginal cases, the request may have to go through channels as far as Director Gerald Eddy for approval.

If at any point the employee is refused the right to take the outside work, he has the right to appeal to the next higher authority. The state police department operates under a similar system.

The general policy is stated as follows:

Any employee of the department should not engage in any activity for monetary gain when that activity is allied with the conservation field when:

1. So doing would interfere with his regular duties.

2. Such activity might discredit the employee or result in a justifiable criticism of the department.

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
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
