JOURNALISM CLASS READS NEWSPAPERS FROM MANY STATES

Some of the papers subscribed for are the Chicago Daily Tribune, the Toronto Daily Star, Louisville Courier Journal, Fort Worth Star, St. Louis Post Dispatch, New York Times, Cleveland Plain Dealer, Chicago Herald Tribune, Philadelphia Enquirer, Denver Post, San Francisco Chronicle, New Orleans Playmate, Detroit Times, Washington Post and New York News.

Mr. Fred, journalism instructor, has divided the survey into three parts. These parts are given orally on the days assigned. The first report is on the editorials in the paper, the second on the features on the editorial page, and the third is on the paper in general.

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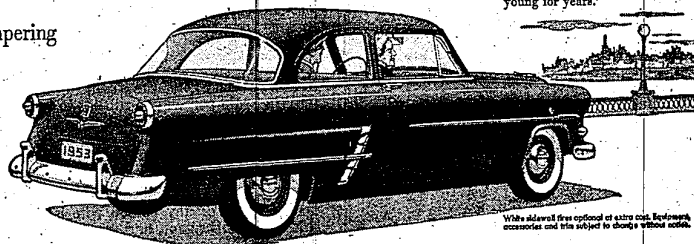
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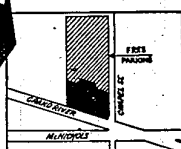
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
