## Farmington Teachers Attend Economics Meet

Mr. Carl Wheaton of the Detroit Public School System, and Tarmo Mattala of the Farmington School System attended an Economics Conference held at the Kellogg Center at Michigan State College on February 27 and 28.

The conference was a follow-up of the 1952 summer workshop in which educators, industrialists, union representatives and agriculturalists participated in incorporating a common economic understanding.

The two main speakers of the conference were Thomas Reid, director of Civic Affairs for the Ford Motor Company, who spoke on "What Is Economic Education From the Viewpoint of Industry", and Prentiss Brown, chairman of the board of the Detroit Edison Company, who presented two topics, "The Tax Problem" and "World Tolerance in Economics".

Conference members then saw the improvements for the 1953 Summer Workshop and considered the possibility of reorganizing the Michigan Council of Economic Education in order to provide functional as a guiding force in the state economic education program.

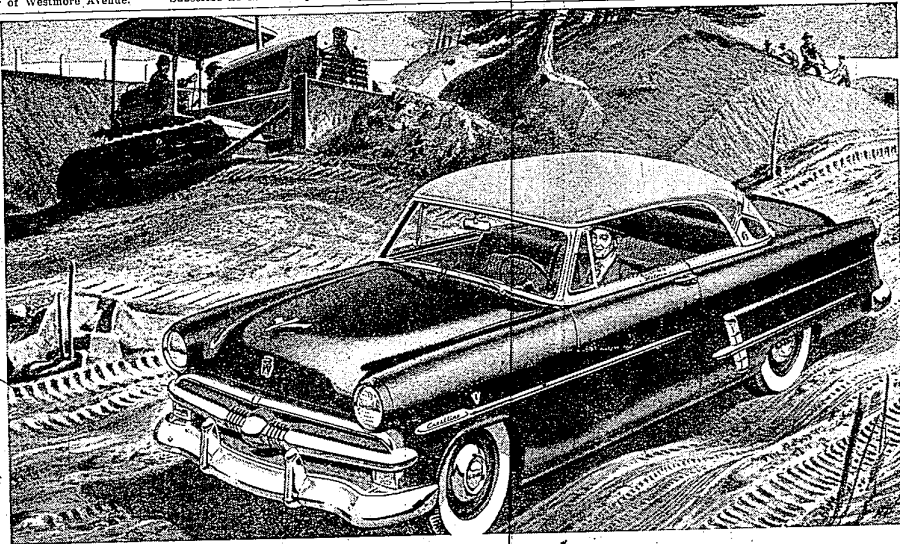
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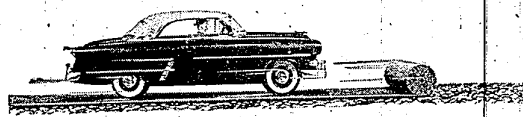
