

BENTLEY OVERPOWERS FALCONS IN FINALS

Falcons Falter, Opponents Post 70-48 Victory

Bentley's Ford Paces
Winners With 23 Points

Bentley High continued on its way toward a state title by overpowering the Farmington Falcons 70-48 in the District Basketball Tournament played on the Bentley floor March 6.

Farmington's starting lineup was: guards, W. Maki and D. Tyler; forwards, J. McCaffrey and J. Rice; and center, Ed Klees.

Bentley's Bulldogs started fast by scoring four points before any points were tallied by the Falcons. Dick Tyler and Ed Klees closed the gap as they hit on shots to light up the Farmington side of the scoreboard. Bentley piled up an 18-11 lead at the end of the first quarter.

The Falcons were outscored 20 to 14 in the second quarter as Bentley pulled away to a 35-25 halftime lead.

Bentley continued to outscore the Falcons in the third and fourth quarters. Nichols, McCaffrey and Tyler carried most of the scoring brunt for the Falcons.

Jim Ford of Bentley led the scorers of both teams with 23 points. Dick Tyler and John McCaffrey paced Farmington with 16 and 15 points respectively.

'Crackers' Retain Lead In Boys' Bowling League

John Gazley took honors in high game bowling with 163. L. Harden and L. Vanburg followed with 162 and 157 respectively.

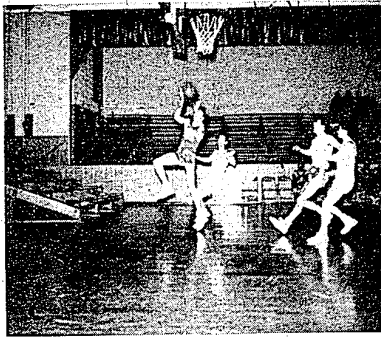
Gazley also has the high average of the league with 158, followed by D. Bowers, 137; L. Harden, 135; and G. Walters, 127.

Clarenceville Freshmen Post Winning Season

The Clarenceville freshman basketball team wound up the 1952-53 season with 6 wins and 4 losses. The Trojans opened the season with two straight losses, one to Farmington 46-19 and the other to Southfield 36-24.

They then broke into the win column by trouncing Milford 32-9 on the home boards.

The Trojan quietest marked up its record with a win by drubbing the freshmen from South Lyon 43-20.

After a 50-35 beating handed to them by Redford Union, the Clarenceville trojans marched to four straight triumphs by beating Southfield 35-16, Farmington 35-23, South Lyon 37-29, and Milford 34-23.

However, in their last game the Trojans, after leading throughout the game, lost an exciting tilt to Redford Union by two points.

The final score was C. H. S. 35, Redford Union 37.

In their winning season the trojans scored 330 points to their opponents' 244 points.

Jimmy Jones led the Trojan scoring with a game average of 11.6.

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Falcons Defeat Trojans 53-48 In First Round Of District Tourney

The Farmington Falcons chalked up their first victory in four games as they overpowered a fighting Clarenceville team 53-48 in the first round of the District Basketball tournament played on the Bentley floor Thursday, March 5.

The starting line-up for the victorious Falcons was: B. Stumbaugh and W. Maki, guards; J. McCaffrey and J. Rice, forwards; and D. Tyler, center.

Clarenceville started quickly and gained an early 6-2 lead before the Falcons began hitting on long shots by Dick Tyler, Jerry Rice and John McCaffrey.

Farmington took advantage of numerous Clarenceville fouls and led at the end of the first quarter 18-12. Farmington tallied 11 points in the second quarter to widen the lead to 31-21 at the intermission.

Chuck Maki led the way against the Trojans by counting up four points.

Clarenceville came fighting back in the third period to score 20 points while the Falcons only tallied 6.

Clarenceville, led by Tom R.

th, gained a 41-37 lead at the quarter's end.

The final quarter was a hectic one with the lead changing hands several times. Clarenceville maintained a four point lead throughout most of the quarter. With about three minutes remaining Farmington's Dick Tyler fouled out. Clarenceville apparently thought everything was sewed up, but John Farwell added three points before Jerry Rice put Farmington into a two-point lead on foul shots. Werner Maki scored three points in the last 20 seconds to give Farmington a 53-48 victory.

The Rutland of Clarenceville led the scorers of both teams with 14 points. The Falcons showed fine balance in the scoring department with Maki 12, Rice 12, Tyler 11 and McCaffrey 10, leading the way in the point totals.

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TROJANS TAKE FIFTH PLACE IN LEAGUE

The Clarenceville Trojans wrapped up their 1952-53 basketball season by winning five games out of 15 starts, for a season average of 23.3. Five of the Trojan defeats

were suffered in heartbreaking clinches, when they were beaten in the final minutes by only a few points.

Clarenceville racked up its five victories over South Lyon, Holly,

Farmington, Clarkston and Milford during the season, while losing twice to Bentley, Brighton and Northville and once to South Lyon, Clarkston, Milford and Holly.

The Trojans notched three league victories to seven defeats to bag fifth place in the W. O. C. league standing.

The Clarenceville quintet made 600 points during the past season

for an average of 44.5 points per game. The Trojans' opponents scored a total of 763 tallies, equaling 50.8 points a game.

Bentley scored the highest total points in a single game against the Trojans as they sank 39 points. South Lyon scored the least total points as the Trojans held them to 21 points.

The Trojans were found guilty of 265 fouls during the season, with Pat Killen being caught 41 times. Rutla committed 39 fouls, Myers 37, and Torsley 32 to round out the total for the season. Clarenceville averaged 17.9 fouls per game.

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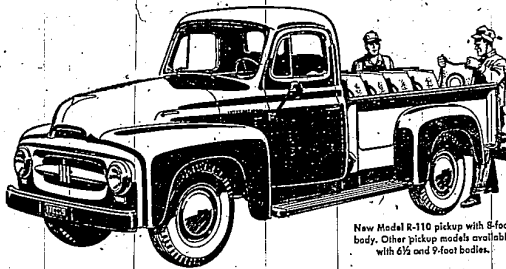
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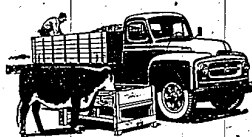
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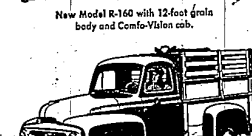
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
