Donald Hossler has been reappointed director of the Farmington Area Recreation program. It was announced following a meeting of the Commission held Wednesday evening at the Farmington High School.

The president presented a proposed budget for the year 1953 and it was tentatively approved. A report on the winter swimming program was presented to the members. The program has been highly successful this year with an average of 50 boys and girls making the trip to the Highland Park YMCA each week. Swimming is held every Saturday evening from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

SEEK PROPOSALS FOR MAIL RUN TO DETROIT ANNEX

Sealed proposals are now being taken at the Farmington Post Office for the carrying of mail from Farmington to the Roosevelt Park Annex of the Detroit Post Office, Charles H. Harnisch, acting postmaster, announced Tuesday.

Headline for the proposals has been set for Friday, March 20. Harnisch stated that proposals must be secured at the Farmington Post Office. According to the specifications, trips are required daily except Sundays and holidays. The distance to be covered is approximately 19 miles one way.

"Persons bidding must be 16 years of age or over and suitable to be entrusted with the care and custody of the mails. Proposals must be made at a yearly rate for all service required."

VA CUTS STAFF, OPERATION COSTS KEPT LOWER

The cost of operating Veterans Administration during fiscal year 1952 less than 3 cents out of the field stations from \$13 to \$4 during the year, and the total number of its employees from 122,812 to 174,597 over the same period, despite an increase of approximately 6,000 employees in the medical program during the year.

Cash benefits total slightly more than 78 cents.

Medical benefits and veterans' counseling took nearly 14 cents and construction and repairs took a little over two cents.

VA spent \$5.39 billion during fiscal 1952, and \$5.20, 1951. Of this amount, \$4.85 billion was spent from funds appropriated by the Congress and the balance from trust and other funds.

The amount spent from appropriated funds came from the taxpayers; whereas, the amount spent from trust and other funds came from premiums paid by veterans on their life insurance, for which VA acts as the trustee, and from additional sources other than taxpayers' dollars.

Of the \$4.86 billion spent from the taxpayers' dollars, \$2.85 billion was distributed in cash benefits to or in behalf of veterans or their dependents and beneficiaries under the laws enacted by the Congress. [This represents 79.2 percent of the expenditures from the taxpayers' dollars.]

Applicants who receive certificates will have 90 days in which to install gas heating equipment. If, in that period, the customer does not arrange for the installation of such equipment, his name will be dropped from the approved list.

Officials stated that it will be impossible to issue permits to everyone presently on the priority list.
