For 18 Long Years You Have Had No Strongly Contested Election for Circuit Judges

Why is this true? Generally only a lawyer is qualified for the Circuit Court Bench. Able lawyers have discouraged themselves from trying to unseat any Circuit Judge, be he good or bad. Lawyers know it is about impossible to beat out a judge at election when he carries the ballot label of "Circuit Judge".

State Senators Blondy and Hutchinson said at Lansing, February 25, 1953, "A lot of good lawyers would like to run for the Bench, but the incumbent designation on the ballot perpetuates those in office."

When these good Senators attempted to remove this unfairness from the Judge ballot, the Lansing News Bureau reported, February 26, 1953, as follows: "In the Senate, pressure from Judges stymied a proposal to eliminate their designation as incumbents on the nonpartisan election ballot."

IT IS TIME FOR A CHANGE. Because a man is designated "incumbent" or "Circuit Judge" does not mean he is best fitted for the high honor and privilege of serving as Oakland County Circuit Judge. The citizens of Oakland County should have opportunity to vote for someone else as judge if they desire. Several thousand citizens, by constitutional nomination, asked William John Beer to give them that opportunity. Mr. Beer has accepted their nomination. A JUDGE MUST KNOW THE LAW. From time of graduation from Law College in 1930 until 1937, William John Beer was with a Detroit Law Firm; although then living in Oakland County. In 1937, he opened his own law offices at Royal Oak where he remained until he enlisted in the United States Navy in 1942. After his discharge from the Service, he practiced law in Rural Northern Michigan for three years. There he handled the legal problems of farmers and miners as well as city business problems. For years he has practiced law at your county seat, Pontiac, Michigan, where he is senior member of the law firm, "Beer and Osgood". Mr. Beer is past president of the South Oakland Bar Association. He is a respected member of the Oakland County Bar, Michigan State Bar, and American Bar Associations. He is a past Circuit Court Commissioner, A City Attorney, and a School Board Lawyer. A JUDGE MUST BE ALERT. Age is important! Remember, the Judges elected April 6, 1953, take office January 1, 1954, for a six-year term. William John Beer, although he has been a lawyer for 22 years, is only 44 years of age. He is in his prime. WILLIAM JOHN BEER IS ACTIVE AND ALERT.

À JUDGE SHOULD BE PATIENT AND HAVE PLEASANT DIGNITY. Impatience has no place on the Bench. The people and their lawyers should have the "ears" of the Court, but seldom his "voice". He must be sober and industrious on and off the Bench. He must be fair minded and courteous. WILLIAM JOHN BEER, WHO IS JUST BUT SCHOLARLY, KIND BUT FIRM, HAS THE PATIENCE AND DIGNITY FOR A GREAT JUDGE.

A JUDGE SHOULD BE A FAMILY MAN. Many problems coming before the Court concern children and families. William John Beer is married. Dora Beer is his wife. They have three sons, Dick, 22 years; Wally, 18 years, and Johnny, 8 years; and two dogs. He knows the sympathy, understanding, but firmness necessary when dealing with children today. For years he has been a member of the Domestic Relations Committee of the Michigan State Bar. He is recognized as an expert in solving divorce matters. Divorce cases involving the nation's children are the largest group of cases by bought before the Circuit Courts. WILLIAM JOHN BEER IS A FAMILY MAN. HE BELIEVES IN STRICTER COMPLIANCE WITH DIVORCE LAWS.

A JUDGE SHOULD UNDERSTAND THE PROBLEMS OF BUSINESSMEN. Mr. Beer, while handling the affairs of owners of various businesses, has successfully operated a Hardware Store, a Wholesale Fruit Company, and a Grocery Store.
