## TRY BROILED FISH THESE LENTEN DAYS SAYS ECONOMIST

Most cooking ranges have broilers these days, points out Martha Purdom, Michigan State College home economist, and she urges you to get acquainted with that broiler during this Lenten season. "This is a time to test your ingenuity for preparing meatless meals," says Miss Purdom. She has some pointers on fish cookery in the broiler.

As a general rule swordfish, cod steaks and broiled trout are especially delicious when broiled. Put them about an inch from the broiler flame or coil, baste with butter or oleomargarine and take them out a golden brown. Miss Purdom says swordfish, especially, has a very delicate flavor prepared this way.

Here's a variation of a codfish soufflé done in the broiler. Place four small cod steaks, seasoned with salt and pepper, on a well-greased baking sheet. Broil for about ten minutes or until almost done, three inches from the flame. Combine and mix 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/4 cup drained pickle relish, two tablespoons minced parsley, one tablespoon lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce and a few drops of tabasco. Fold into that mixture two well-beaten egg whites and spread on the broiled fish. Take this delicacy out of the broiler when the topping is puffed up and gone brown.

Miss Purdom advises that fish is an excellent source of protein — as good as meat, in fact. Another protein source is cheese, which can be used to good advantage during Lent in hearty casseroles, rarebits and sauces.

## TRADESMEN RULES PRINTED IN 1852 MAY STILL APPLY

Some rules for tradesmen published in the Grand River Times, Grand Haven, in 1852 may still apply.

According to the copy of the newspaper in the Michigan Historical Collections at the University of Michigan, an unknown writer suggested to tradesmen:

Trust nothing to speculation and avoid all paper-money schemes to deceive the public and uphold a false credit.

Acquire a neatness and dispatch in everything you do; yet avoid the affected bustle, cringing smile and vulgarity of some tradesmen.

Talk to your customers like a man of sense and business, not like a mountebank.

Never trade beyond your stock or give or take too large credit.

Better slip a bargain now and then than buy a greater quantity of goods than you can pay for.

Cragily of creditors is always in proportion to the dishonesty of debtors.

For the first five or six years of business, a tradesman ought to consider himself as worth nothing, or as having no money which can be taken out of the business and spent on the luxuries of life.

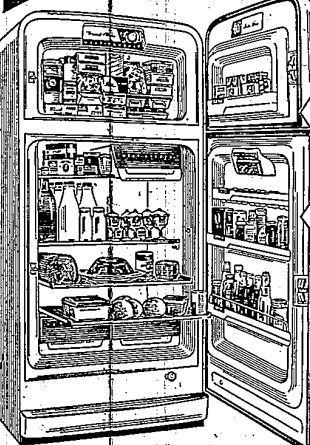

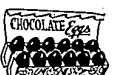
