FUTURE TEACHERS AT YPSILANTI TO MEET APRIL 22

Future Teachers of America Clubs from thirty high schools in southeastern Michigan have been invited to the Michigan State Normal College campus on April 22 to meet with teachers and students actually involved in teacher education. Sponsored by the college district of the Michigan Education Association, the affair is expected to bring three to four hundred high school students who are planning to enter the teaching profession to the campus. Joining with the Michigan Education Association is the program which will be the Student Council, the Men's Union, the Women's League, and Pi Omega Pi, a business education fraternity at the college.

High schools in which Future Teachers Clubs are not yet organized but which have interested groups are being asked to send representatives. The Future Teachers Club movement represents an effort to bring young people planning to enter the teaching profession into close contact with the problems they will face as teachers. Too, it represents an effort to recruit those who have not yet made up their minds to enter a profession in which shortages are yearly becoming more acute.

A full day's program is planned for the visiting students. Miss Pearl Baxter, a member of the faculty at Roosevelt School, the college's campus training school, heads the committee making plans for the events. Joining with her are representatives of all the groups mentioned above.
