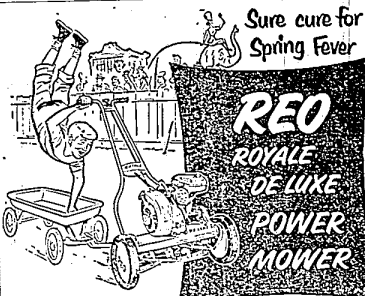

A FEATURE: PARKING SPACE LIMITED FOR F.H.S. STUDENTS

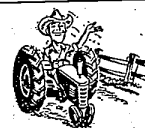

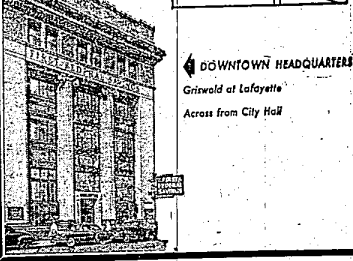
