

ACTION EXPECTED ON CONTRACTS AT CLARENCEVILLE

It is expected that all three units will be completed in time for the opening of school in September. The Westbrook School is being built on Omega Street and the Botsford School is on Lathers Street.

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Catholics Plan May Day Demonstration in Detroit

Father James Keller, M.M., founder and director of the Christopher Movement, will speak at the seventh annual May Day Demonstration of Faith in St. Aloysius Church at Washington Boulevard, which is sponsored by the Detroit Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Men. The day is Friday, May 1, and the starting time is 5:45 p.m.

Father Keller was the first priest to start these public demonstrations of faith on May Day as an answer to the Communists, who had attempted to make the day synonymous with the militant program and atheism of Communism. This day was traditionally known in the church as Mary's Day. In this area we can proudly say that May Day is once again Mary's Day. Since the first May Day Demonstration of Faith in 1947, no public meeting has been held by the Communists in Detroit on May Day.

Every Catholic of the area is urged to attend the service. Groups and Councils of Catholic Men are asked to attend in delegations.

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CANT WIN!!

If we say "it's sure a swell day" by the time you get to read this the elements will be kicking' up a fuss again — and if we gripe about the snow and wind and rain then the sun will be shinin' and it'll be a beautiful day in Chicago — so might just as well skip all the idle chatter and get right down to talkin' turkey only this week it ain't turkey — it's ham — the shank end of a tenderized ham fer 59c a lb. (When you have ham seems like you kinnda always think of sweet potatoes. We aint got no fresh ones but if yer right handy with a can opener we can fix you up with a couple cans of 'em fer 65c. If yer lucky you'll have some left over fer, some ham on rye and a cup of coffee. Fer the coffee you can get either S & W or Folgers Mountain grown fer 89c a lb. this week. Maybe a little cheese on the side would be kinnda good. We have some sharp that'll make yer hair stand on end fer 69c a lb. If you don't like it quite that strong there's some medium fer 59c a lb. Course you'll need some butter and since so many people told us how good that Tildens butter is we'll believe 'em and give you some more of the same fer 69c a lb. If you have storage space in the top of yer refrigerator you had could stick a few pounds up there while the price is down. Had you thought about that??

Have you given much thought to this summer? Are you gonna have a garden? Are you gonna stand over a hot stove all day doin' yer caddin'? Right now we have some good low lockers fer rent. If you wanna come in and git one and leave a small deposit on it the rent won't start until you bring in yer first fruits or vegetables. Of course this only applies to the lockers rented by the year. Do you know much about lockers? They come in two styles — kinnda like yer kitchen cupboards. The low ones are drawer style lockers that pull out and rent fer \$16.00 a year (The high ones are door style that just open up and rent fer \$14.00 a year. You git your own key fer lockers and we don't charge you fer that unless you lose it. These lockers are all somewhat over 5 cubic feet in capacity. If you bring yer food in all frozen properly and marked with yer locker number on it there is no charge fer putting it in yer locker — but if you want it sharp frozen fast yer there is a small charge. All foods have to be properly wrapped and identified. That is not our rule — it is a law for everyone's protection. If you are interested stop in the first part of the week and we'll be glad to answer all yer questions. Seems like on week ends we jest don't have too much time to be sociable. OK??

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
