candidate Eisenhower called him as his No. 1 aide in the presidential campaign following the Chicago convention. Governor Sherman Adams was serving the last few months of his second term and looking forward to retiring from public life. But like so many of the men now working with the new president in Washington, he was "smitten" with the ability, the political philosophy, and the crusading zeal of Dwight Eisenhower.

Governor Adams was with Eisenhower on every step of his 10,000 mile campaign back and forth across the country. And it was noted that the two worked in almost perfect harmony as a team. Adams emerged as perhaps the most intimate associate and adviser of Eisenhower, and with his characteristic determination to "see the thing through" he accepted the hardworking job as the President's chief executive assistant, passing over opportunities for various Cabinet posts. Both he and Mr. Eisenhower felt that as the President's "good right arm" he could be of greatest value to the new administration.

STATE TO SURVEY WILT DISEASE IN OAK TREES

The conservation department is planning again to survey the extent of oak wilt in southern Michigan this year.

Aerial and ground surveys will show whether or not the disease has spread from last year.

The fungus attacks red oaks and is almost always fatal to the tree.

First discovered in Michigan in 1951, the disease has since been located in 16 southern counties. Most northerly of the 57 recorded cases is in Kent county.

Curbing the killer has offered a real problem to foresters, who are still not certain how it spreads from area to area. Generally when infected trees are found they are promptly destroyed, but seemingly this does not prevent spread of the disease. In the last several years, 19 midwestern states have reported cases.

Affected areas in Michigan are as yet small, often only single trees or a few trees in a woodlot. The largest area of kill is about two acres in size.

Michigan Fires Increase With Outdoor Season

Forty-one fires burned 184 acres of woods and grass lands during the last week, raising the total of acres damaged during 1953 to 734.

Largest increase was noted in the upper peninsula, from three fires last week to 19 this week. Two fires occurred in the southern lower peninsula; 20 in the northern lower peninsula. All were relatively small burns, though the spring hazard season is developing rapidly and fishermen and picnickers are urged to exercise caution in use of fire.

Trapping Season Ends, May Set New Record

Trappers in the northern lower peninsula took 321 beaver and 191 otter during the recently-ended season, the conservation department reports.

The beaver total is nearly double the 1952 figure, when 1,628 were taken, and gives indication that the total state catch will be high. Trappers took 145 otter in 1952.

The largest increase from last year was reported in the Mio district, where the jump was about 500 beaver last year to more than 1,200 this year. "Sizeable increases were noted in all areas except near Baldwin, where the catch was nearly identical with that of 1952,"
