FARMINGTON GRABS THIRD IN LEAGUE MEET

The Farmington Falcon track team made off with five firsts as they placed third in the InterLakes League track meet at Ferndale May 7 with 33½ points.

Walled Lake High School took the top spot for the sixth straight year with a total of 74 points. Waterford placed second with a team total of 44 points. Keego Harbor, Southfield and Berkley finished in that order behind the Falcons.

Walled Lake piled up most of their points in the hurdles and the 100 yard dash in which Farmington's sprinters failed to place. Farmington's medley relay team composed of J. Brewbaker, W. Goers, R. Goers and D. Grimsbaw gained a five-year victory in a time of 2:44.7. The 440 was run in two heats with J. Phelps taking second in the first heat and Dave Harris notching third in the second heat.

Bob Mansfield and Dick Sutherland placed first and fifth for the Falcons in the mile run. The 1-4-4 established a new league record. Jim Bryan led all the way as he posted his best time of the year in the \$80 yard run to successfully defend his half-mile title. The time was 2:00.5. Paul Lewis placed fifth for Farmington in his best time of the year in 2:13.

In the most exciting event of the meet, Farmington's Arnold Corbett tied for first place in the pole vault. The height of 11' 1½" was cleared by both Corbett and Revolver of Walled Lake after all events were completed. The old record was 10' 11½". Corbett leaped 15' in the broad jump but failed to place.

Don Nichols, freshman high jumper, placed fourth with his best leap of his early competition, a jump of 5' 4".

Roger Goers grabbed off first position in the shotput with a heave of 41' 8".
