MSC COMMENCEMENT SCHEDULED JUNE 7 AT EAST LANSING

Selection of a speaker and the awarding of three honorary degrees have been announced for Michigan State College's June 7 commencement exercises.

President Frederick L. Gordon of Purdue University will address an estimated 2,000 graduates in ceremonies set for 5:00 p.m. June 7 in the MSC Mackinac Stadium.

Honorary degrees will be awarded to Lloyd C. Emmons, retired dean of the MSC school of Science and Arts; Ernest Hart, executive vice-president of Foods Machinery and Chemical Corporation, Niagara chemical division, Middletown, New York; and to William James Clench, curator of mollusks, Museum of Comparative Zoology, Harvard University.

Emmons retired in 1952 after 43 years of service at Michigan State and will receive the honorary doctor of laws degree. He served as dean of the School of Science and Arts from 1948 to 1952. As chairman of the MSC athletic council for many years, he was instrumental in Michigan State's admission to the Western Conference in 1948.

Hart, who graduated from MSC in 1914, will receive the doctor of agriculture degree in recognition of his outstanding contributions to the chemistry of agricultural poisons.

Clench, who received the B. S. degree from MSC in 1921, will receive the doctor of science degree. Clench is a leading world zoologist.

STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENTS WILL HANDLE GLOBULIN

State health departments throughout the nation will hold the key this summer to distribution of gamma globulin to fight polio.

Dr. Ernest W. Bauer of Hazel Park, blood chairman for Oakland County Chapter of the American Red Cross, this week explained the distribution system as set up by the U. S. Office of Defense Mobilization.

State health departments will be provided as much of the gamma globulin as possible as the polio season opens. The amount will be based on each state's five-year average of polio cases.

Local health departments and private physicians seeking "GG" will apply to the state health department.

Dr. Bauer pointed out that this plan is easily modified, if experience indicates it should be.

"The National Research Council has recommended that 'GG' be provided for other members of the households in which polio occurs — particularly members under 20 and pregnant women, he said; but the responsibility will rest with the state health department."

Dr. Bauer said about 57 per cent of the total supply of "GG" will be distributed to state health departments. An additional 33 per cent will be available for community-wide inoculations and 10 per cent for special emergencies.

Admission and parking at the Carnival and Exposition are free. Also is the great entertainment program to be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoons and evenings before the Detroit Race Course grandstand. Admission to more than 100 exhibits under the grandstand also will be free.

There will be free square dancing with Governor Williams calling out the dances at 2:00 p.m.

The entertainment will include circus acts, horse acts, a Junior horse show and a Western Horse show.

On Friday and Saturday nights Robert Seymour, the "Bobbin' with Robin" show on WKMG, will make personal appearances with celebrities as guests.

A large, beautiful doll house, replete with breezeway and garage, will be on exhibit at the Carnival. Meanwhile, the \$20,000 Dream Home on Five Mile near Farmington Road will be open for inspection every day from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. The doll house is the annual donation to the Carnival of Harry E. Wolfe, Livonia builder.

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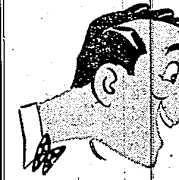

Mrs. Austin Ault of Brentwood Avenue is spending this Saturday at South Lyon.

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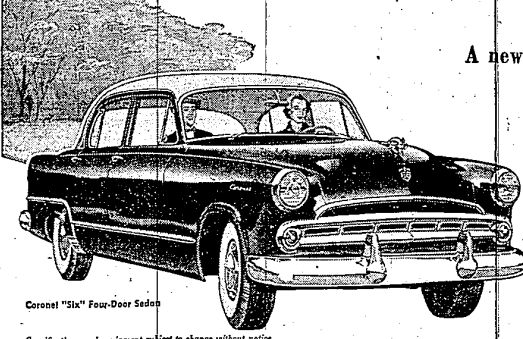
