ion by School Attorney A. G. Leonard regarding compulsory vaccination of pupils. According to Leonard, a school board has no power to adopt a general continuing rule, operative without regard to varying conditions, excluding all pupils who have not been vaccinated.

"It is my opinion," continued Leonard, "that such a requirement as is proposed would be illegal and unenforceable."

The board filed an expression of appreciation to the Board of Education for their assistance in supplying a water tank so that the Middlebelt School could be reopened. The school was closed for several days because of a lack of water due to a damaged screen in the water pump. The huge tank was equipped with a pump and hooked to a water hydrant near the school to provide a temporary supply.
