STUDENTS VISIT NEWSPAPER, TV PLANTS IN DETROIT

On Wednesday, May 13, the speech class of Clarenceville High School took a trip to the Detroit News building. They saw both the newspaper and the television station. They left at 8:30, got there at 10:00 and returned to school at 1:30 p.m.

The first place they visited was the Detroit News. The class visited the editorial department and the library, which has 25,500 books and 2 million clippings. After the library was the composing room where they saw the Linotype machines. They were given a paper mache impression of the paper. This serves as a mold. They then went to the main press room, which has 60 printing units. If all of the pressmen at once, 3,600 papers a minute could be printed. That means printed, cut, folded, counted and delivered to bundlers.

The rotogravure, the comic section and magazines are printed elsewhere. If a year's supply of paper was laid end to end, it would encircle the earth eighteen times. After seeing the News, the class went underground to the WVV television station. WVV is the world's oldest commercial broadcasting station. Both it and the newspaper are owned by the Scripps family. The original transmitter, which could be heard for 100 miles, is on exhibit at the station.

There are five studios. The students saw Studio A. The studio is 4,650 square feet, costing \$40 persons. It is made of "floating construction". That is, the walls, ceiling and floors are mounted on cushions of felt packing to shield

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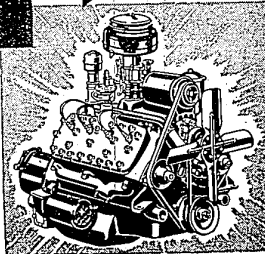
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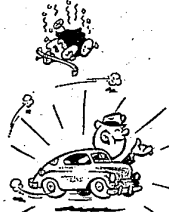


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Fresh Favorite

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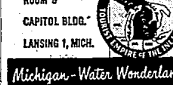


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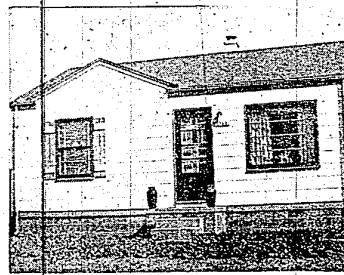
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
