We welcome Mr. and Mrs. Paul Cummings and their daughter, Nora Mae, who are new to Springbrook Drive.

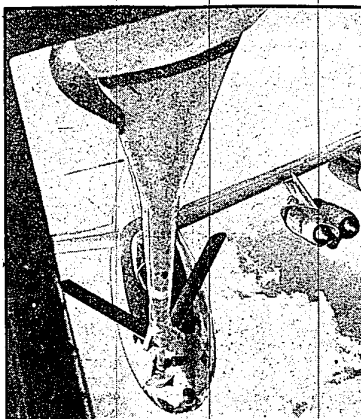

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## Dairy President At Annual Meet

Mr. Joseph Himmelsbach, president of Farmington Dairy, was a guest at the annual meeting of the Dairy Council of Detroit, held at the Park Shelton Thursday, May 14.

Dr. Dena Cederquist, associate professor of Home Economics at Michigan State College, spoke on "Sense and Nonsense About Milk."

"Women, more often than men," stated Dr. Cederquist, "tend to reduce their calorie intakes as they grow older. Research has indicated that even though the calorie needs of the adult woman may decrease with age, her need for other nutrients — protein, minerals and vitamins does not decrease proportionately. It becomes necessary, therefore, that the selection of food be such that each item in the diet contributes more than the calories. Milk is one food which contributes high quality protein, certain minerals and vitamins as well as calories. It is a food around which adequate diet for individuals of all ages can be most easily and economically built."

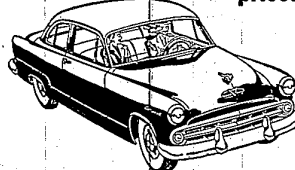

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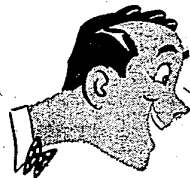
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
