A Farmington High School senior has been awarded a \$200 college scholarship by the American Legion state commander, Eugene N. Houck.

William Kingsley, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Kingsley of 33216 Shilavasee, has been named as one of twenty in the state to receive the award.

Selections were made through the Guy M. Wilson Memorial scholarship committee in honor of the Michigan Legion's third state commander who died in 1936.

Now in its sixteenth year, a cash total of \$45,297 in scholarships has been provided 267 Michigan youths during that period.

Sons of men who are veterans of World Wars I and II and the Korean conflict, this year's twenty winners will use their scholarships at any Michigan college they choose to attend.

RED CROSS FUND FIGURES MADE KNOWN

Devotion of volunteers and community generosity was credited last Wednesday with raising \$147,650.36 in the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross fund drive this year.

Farmington Township has raised a total of \$4,956.99 in donations and pledges toward its quota of \$6,000 for this year.

Latest figures on the campaign were released Wednesday night, June 3, by Gay A. Sweeney, campaign chairman, to some 200 men and women attending the chapter's annual dinner at Christ Church, Cranbrook.

The amount, although only 52 percent of the chapter's \$173,369 quota, is the highest total raised in any local Red Cross fund drive since World War II.

"It's impossible for us to thank the thousands of solicitors who do this job," Sweeney said. "Not only do these volunteers raise the funds for us to operate — but they tested the Red Cross story in every home."

Sweeney expressed special congratulations to 15 communities which topped their goals and appreciation for the \$61,000 contributed by various united funds in the county.

A chapter treasurer's report by Harold Euler shows the chapter's receipts totaled \$19,436.70 during the year ending in May. The organization spent \$59,087.36, leaving a balance of \$127,886.46.

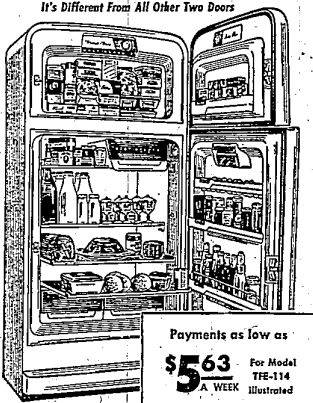
