The most pressing problem before the Farmington electorate at the moment is the question of increased school taxes to be decided at the polls next Monday.

As most of you probably know, the Board of Education of the Farmington Township Schools has been busy in the past six weeks giving information on the school situation to a Citizens' Advisory Committee of representatives from various organizations, including your own Civic Association.

Without going into the details of school finances, which have been presented elsewhere in The Enterprise, it is clear that the proposed tax raise is absolutely necessary just to maintain existing standards of instruction. Although it may be difficult to conceive of anyone — especially with children — opposing this minimum program, it is important that the overwhelming affirmative vote be registered next Monday in order that the School Board has a clear mandate not only to preserve existing standards but also to improve the quality of our educational facilities.

At its regular monthly meeting last Monday evening, your Civic Association's executive board resolved a report on the school finance problem from its representative to the Citizens' Advisory Committee, and voted unanimously to go on record in support of the school Board's current proposal and to circulate information on the subject to the membership.
