POLIO EMERGENCY TRAINING COURSE SET FOR JUNE 22

Plans for the third annual training course for Polio Emergency Volunteers got under way this week. The group will help cope with any outbreaks of infantile paralysis in Oakland County this summer. It was announced by Mrs. James Lillie of Farmington, P. E. V. chairman for the local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

"Whenever polio strikes," Mrs. Lillie said, "one of the most pressing problems is to obtain enough hands to assist in caring for victims. To help solve this need, Polio Emergency Volunteers will be recruited and trained well in advance to ease the burden of professional personnel in case of emergencies."

Members will undergo a short but intensive training course beginning June 22 at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac. Medical staff members will instruct in many non-technical tasks of bedside nursing and polio care.

Assisting Mrs. Lillie as secretary is Mrs. Arnold Hillerman, Pontiac. Also attending the planning meeting were Mrs. Erwin Bell, Royal Oak, chairman of women's activities in South Oakland County; Mrs. Richard Paschke, Commerce, Pontiac chairman of Women's activities; and Mrs. Ruth Parrish, executive secretary of the Oakland County chapter.

Approval of the course was given by Sister Mary Phillipa, St. Joseph Mercy Hospital administrator, and Dr. Harold R. Boehm, polio committee chairman. Other hospital personnel aiding are Sister Mary Janice, Sister Mary Rosella, Marie Hickey, nursing service director, Dorothy Williams, and Jeanne Ryskamp, physical therapist.

American Red Cross units also are cooperating. Mrs. Edward Rothman of Birmingham, chairman of nurses aides, and Mrs. H. H. Rodriguez, Royal Oak, chairman of nurse recruitment, attended. Mrs. Louis Boyington, Livonia, Eastern Michigan chairman of women's activities of the National Foundation, also was present.

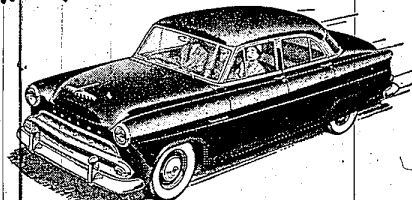
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
