OFFER TRAINING COURSE FOR POLIO CARE

Dr. Robert J. Mason of Birmingham will lecture on poliomyelitis to open the Polio Emergency Volunteer training course June 22 at 7:30 in St. Joseph Mercy Hospital nurses' home, Pontiac.

Men and women over 21, in good health and with no children under the age of 14, are eligible for the four week course. The volunteers will be given 18 hours of instruction in non-technical duties of polio care. They will be trained to assist physicians and nurses in event of an emergency.

Director of the course is Sister Mary Janice, R.N., who lists the instructors as Mrs. H. Rodriguez, R.N., Royal Oak, of the American Red Cross; Nurse Dorothy Williams, Nurse Barbara Kemp and Physical Therapist Jeanne Ryskamp of St. Joseph Mercy Hospital.

The course is sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, the hospital, and the American Red Cross. Enrollment may be made by phoning Mrs. Ruth Parshall, executive secretary of the Oakland County chapter of the, at Federal 2-3361.

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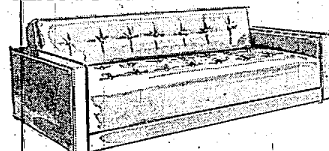
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
