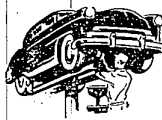

Nurses Complete Special Training

More than sixty registered nurses recently completed specialized training at the polio nursing workshop at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital.

Lectures and practical demonstrations on all phases of the disease were presented as the hospital and county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis combined forces to meet the responsibilities of polio epidemic places on local facilities. More than half the nurses signed to help care for polio patients in local hospitals if needed this summer.

Final session included a talk on orthopedic care by Dr. Robert J. Bannow; rehabilitation and use of braces by Mrs. Lydia Huff, physical therapist; and a talk by Dr. Reese, occupational therapist. "Marbles and Lollipops," a film on gamma globulin as a paralytic preventative, was shown.

A round table discussion "Community agencies work for polio care" centered around Miss Marie Hickey, R.N., hospital nursing director; Mrs. Ruth Parshall, chapter secretary; Miss Estelle Mitchell, R.N., of Oakland County Health Department; Mrs. Maud Bennett, of American Red Cross, and Mrs. Harry York, R.N., former polio patient.

The nurses plan a trip to the respiratory center at Ann Arbor. Hospitality committees included Mrs. Russell Hietzer and Mrs. Richard Paschke. Serving refreshments at the meetings were the Soroptomists, Welcome Rebekahs No. 246, and the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital auxiliary.

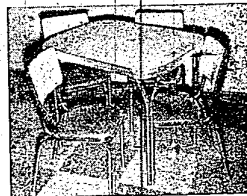
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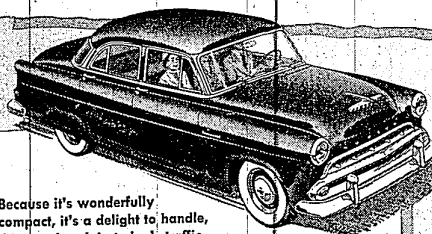
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
