MSC ENGINEERS SPEED SETTING OF CONCRETE

A new process which speeds up the hardening and strengthening of concrete by as much as 60 per cent has been developed by two Michigan State College engineers.

Discovery at MSC's Engineering Experiment Station is expected to be highly useful in construction of main highways, bridges, city streets and large buildings where it is desirable for concrete to gain strength as rapidly as possible.

The research project was conducted by R. J. Claus and J. T. McCall, assistant professor of engineering at MSC under sponsorship of the Dow Chemical Company of Midland. Results showed the "speed-up" takes place if a newly-developed pellet is added to Portland cement concrete during mixing.

"The familiar flake form of calcium chloride has been used as a strength accelerator for Portland cement concrete for about 50 years," the two engineers said. "The new anhydrous pellet is a better accelerator, however, since it results in increasing the setting time process when compared to concrete containing flake chloride."

Concrete ordinarily hardens in about two to ten hours and gains strength gradually thereafter, reaching its design strength in about 28 days. The new pellet form of calcium chloride was found to boost the process as much as 60 per cent on the third day after the concrete was poured.

Issues Safety Appeal To Drivers

"Check Your Speed" is the slogan of a two-months campaign now being started throughout Michigan under the direction of the State Safety Commission.

"Because speed is Public Enemy No. 1 on the highways, special emphasis is being given to the effort to convince motorists that they should pay more attention to how fast they are going," said State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs in announcing the drive on behalf of the commission, of which he is a member.

City and county law enforcement officers, judges, safety organizations and others will be among those participating in the appeal. Press, radio and television, leaflets and posters will carry the slogan and urge drivers to be constantly aware of their personal danger in going too fast for conditions.

"Figures compiled by the State Police show that last year 48 per cent of all violations reported in fatal traffic accidents were for speeding," Childs said. "This was the highest percentage we have ever had and far exceeded any other type of violation."

"It is a matter of concern that although we had fewer accidents in 1952 there were more deaths due largely to the fact that cars hit with greater force because of the speed at which they were traveling. Speed is the main killer and no driver is so good that he can forget the record."

Michigan does not have a specified maximum speed limit except in zones which are specially posted. The law, however, does provide that speed must be controlled at all times according to conditions, such as type of highway, amount of traffic, weather and visibility.

STATE POLICE ARREST 6,412 DURING MAY

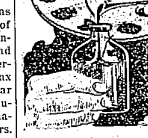
Michigan State Police made 6,412 arrests in May, of which 5,568 were for traffic offenses.

In addition, there were 320 juvenile offenders, including 100 truant and wayward minors and those involved in traffic offenses. Complaints handled in all matters totaled 26,550. The officers also completed 26,550 property inspections and 3,045 liquor inspections.

The East Lansing headquarters identification bureau received 6,715 sets of fingerprints, 4,159 criminal and 2,556 non-criminal. In handling 509 sets submitted in connection with applications for licenses to carry concealed weapons, 50 applicants were found to have criminal records.

Likewise, through fingerprinting 33 persons wanted by police as fugitives from justice were identified.

Scheduled to participate in a two-month training cruise aboard a ship of the U. S. Navy's 1953 Midshipman Practice Squadron is Midshipman third class Brian F. Walker, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence L. Walker of 17243 Middlebelt.

The annual practice cruise, designed to give Naval Academy and NROTC midshipmen an opportunity to "learn by doing" aboard combat ships of the Atlantic Fleet,

will be made by some 1,466 cadets and sophomores of 25 colleges and universities, as well as by the first and third classmen from the Naval Academy.

This year, more than 30 ships, including the battleships USS Missouri and Wisconsin and the light aircraft carrier Salpan, will carry some 3,200 trainees to nine ports in South America and the Caribbean. They left Norfolk, Virginia, on June 8.
