The classes were previously offered on Wednesdays and Fridays.

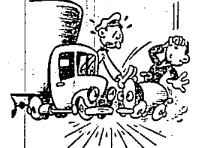
No other changes for the Clarencville program have been made.

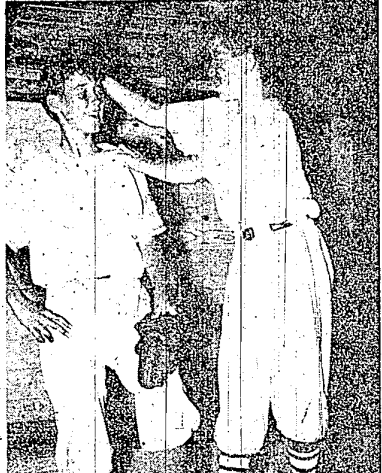

Card - Tiger Tie To Be Replayed

The Cards and the Tigers played eight innings to a 1-1 tie on Friday evening in a game that left the crowd limp with excitement. Umpire-in-chief Jim Warner was forced to suspend play on account of darkness as the teams prepared to go into the third extra inning still deadlocked. Ross Byron, regular Tiger catcher, was on the mound and the first string Tiger pitcher, Chuck Thomson, was behind the plate for the batters. The switch worked even better than Manager Parley Thomson had hoped. The converted catcher failed to make a throw in the entire eighth inning and Thomson caught a fine game, using a left-handed first baseman's mitt.

John Clark went the route for the Cards and though often in trouble, limited the Tigers to four infield singles. His mates saved him from serious trouble in the very first inning when two leg hits and a hit batsman loaded the bases with nobody out. Clark struck

Cubs Take Two; Serve As Spoilers

Dick Wiley made his pitching debut in Little League competition a sparkling success on Wednesday when he went the entire distance for the Star Cutter Cubs as they downed the Blakelee Cards 6-2. The eleven year old towhead whose previous pitching experience had been limited to workouts with his dad in the backyard, came within one out of pitching a no-hitter. He had two away in the final inning when Fred Buesser was safe on an infield error. Big John Clark then came to the plate and promptly clouted one over the left field fence to avert a Card shut-out and deprive Wiley of a perfect game.

The Cubs scored three runs in the first on Chuck Grenville's double, singles by Harry Taylor and John Lapham, a stolen base and a fielder's choice. They got three more in the fourth on a walk, three singles and a pair of errors. Wiley, meanwhile, was mowing the Cards down with a sidearm curve ball and struck out eight while giving up six walks. Cliff Simons was charged with the loss, yielding six hits and walking one while fanning six of the Cubs.

The Star Cutter Cubs won their second start in as many nights on Thursday when they edged the Farmington Dairy Yanks in an extra inning thriller 10-9. Charley Grenville won his own ball game in the bottom of the seventh when he singled home Dick Wiley from third. Grenville went all the way on the hit for the Cubs, yielding twelve hits and walking four in gaining his first victory of the season.

Chuck Habermehl started for the Yanks, giving way to Julius Kovary, in the third. The pair gave up eight hits, one of them a tremendous homer over the center field wall by Bob Hug in the opening stanza. Tom Grimshaw, Chuck Habermehl and Bob Utley each had three for five for the Yanks while Hug, with three for three, and Grenville and Darrel Allen with two safeties each, led the Cub attack.

State Bank Tigers Defeat Cubs 2-1 To Tie Yanks For Little League Lead

On Monday, July 6, Chuck Thomson threw a four-hitter at the Star Cutter Cubs and pitched the Farmington State Bank Tigers into a tie for first place with the Farmington Dairy Yanks.

The final score was 2-1 and Bob Hug of the Cubs, despite a one-hit effort, was the loser.

Chuck was in trouble only in the second inning when Richard Byrne, John Lapham and John Fleck singled to score the only Cub run and in the third when a double play with two men on base got him out of the hole. After that he was unbeatable, striking out eight of the last ten batters who faced him.

Al LeSage, who collected the only Tiger hit, also walked and scored the winning run in the sixth inning.

Last week Chuck Thomson allowed only five hits at the Farmington State Bank Tigers' ballpark the Blakelee Chevrolet Cardinals 10-2 to take over second place in the Little League. The Tigers pounded Card starter Harvey Chapman for nine hits in the four innings he worked and tagged him for thalass. Jim Newburg, ten year old recruit, pitched the 5th and 6th and allowed only one hit.

Thomson showed a world of stuff and had the game well in hand after his mates handed him a three-run lead in the opening frame. He struck out eleven while issuing only four passes and quelled a mild Card uprising in the sixth when, with the bases loaded, he struck out the final batter to end the game.

Al LeSage led the Tiger attack with three hits in four trips, including a drive that smashed through the outfield fence on the fly for a ground rule double. Ed Fulton leaped into a one and two pitch in the third inning and drove the ball over the left field wall to
