### Blakeslee Cards Take Three In Week To Re-Enter League Title Contention

The Blakeslee Cards jumped back into title contention on Saturday as they won their third straight game, downing the Tigers 8-2 in the first half of a double header. In the second game the Farmington Dairy Yankees got back on the victory trail after two straight defeats as they banged out nine hits off Cub starter Chuck Grenville to down Jack Bacon's Star Cutter team 14-2.

Cliff Simons worked the first three innings for the Cards and got credit for the win as he allowed two runs on two hits while fanning six. John Clark pitched the last three frames for Arch McDonald and did not allow a hit as he blanked the hard hitting Blakers. The Cards had a hit in three runs and got a hit to left center and Caris, and Buesser walked. 
