### SEEDLINGS IN CORN FIELDS ARE VALUABLE

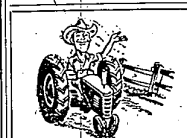
If you want to use that soil between your corn rows, seed rice or sweet clover, suggests a farm crops specialist at Michigan State College.

Herbert R. Pettigrove says the seedlings will help cut down on winter soil erosion and can be plowed under for green manure or used for hay or pasture.

Seedlings between corn rows can be made in several different ways. Some farmers use a seeder on the front of a weeder. One farmer, recalls Pettigrove, attached a seeder to the front of his tractor so he could seed and cultivate in one operation. Other farmers have adjusted grain drills or different types of hand seeders for the operation.

You get the best stand of a seedling, remarks Pettigrove, if the seed is covered only slightly. This is where a weeder or cultivator comes in handy.

Recommended rates of seeding include a bushel to a bushel and a quarter of rice per acre, eight pounds of alfalfa, 12 to 15 pounds of sweet clover, or a mixture of ten pounds of sweet clover and three to four pounds of domestic grass.

### State Farmers Aid Drought-Stricken Areas And Furnish Grazing Pastures

Michigan farmers are being called upon to come to the aid of their drought-stricken Southern neighbors needing hay or pasture.

Work is starting immediately in every Michigan county to find out how much surplus hay there is that could be shipped, under government orders, to the Southwest, where cattle are thinning and falling for lack of grazing moisture.

"We need action right now," stresses D. B. "Woody" Varner, director of the Cooperative Extension Service at Michigan State College. "Action in a couple of weeks will be too late. The cattle will be too far gone to help," says the former Texas well-known quainter with the inroads of drought.

Aid of the MSC extension staff, including the county agricultural agents, has been asked by the federal extension director, C. M. Ferguson, an ex-officio member of the emergency department of Agriculture Committee. Director Varner immediately commissioned E. A. Wenner, district extension supervisor for north Michigan, to head the special project.

"Farmers should contact their county agricultural agent — not wait for him to contact them — if they have surplus hay or pasture," notes Wenner. "The agents will want to know how many tons of hay, what kind and quality it is, and the price. We're primarily interested in hay that is baled and ready to move out now — but also will want figures in hay that will be ready later."

Farmers with excess pasture also should contact agents with the number of acres, kind of pasture and its livestock-carrying capacity. Cattle can be shipped north for grazing on this excess pasture under two plans: (1) Outright rental; (2) Sharing in the sale proceeds on a cow and calf grazing arrangement. Hay sale and pasture contracts will be made between Michigan farmers and individuals in the Southwest who need the aid.

Most of the vegetable and other experiments at the farm have been carried out with a minimum of tillage, points out J. F. Davis, soil scientist and farm supervisor. Work's equipment and methods on parade will include:

Automatic irrigation, unique in the nation, developed by George J. Bouyoucos, soil scientist. Sugar beet mechanical thinning and new-type "wet" nitrogen application machinery, shown by agricultural engineers.

Maggot and thrip control on onions and other vegetables, with talks by entomologists.

Scab control, and other plant disease work, by pathologists.

Farm crops work, including soybeans, popcorn and feed canary grass.

Almost every popular vegetable grown by horticulturists, and mint.

Lyle Jordan of Jackson, Michigan's 1952-53 Onion King, heads the Michigan Muck Farmers Association, working with MSC staff members to present the research work during the big field day.

### Plan Research Day At MSC July 29

Michigan State College specialists will join forces with the Michigan Muck Farmers association on Wednesday, July 29, to review muckland farming research.

The annual Muck Farmers Field Day will be at the college Muck Experimental Farm, near Bath, according to Dr. Lloyd M. Turk, M.S.C. soil science head and experiment station director-designate.

Farm leaders headed by Lyle Jordan of Jackson, who is the Michigan Onion King for 1952 and muck farmers association president, will work with research men from many M.S.C. departments on the field day. Tours of plots will occupy the forenoon. Lunch will be served by women of Bath Methodist Church.

Tillage, fertilization, insect control and many other research advances of interest to muckland farmers will be inspected and discussed. In addition to soil science specialists, there will be research men from such departments as agricultural engineering, botany and plant pathology, farm crops, entomology and horticulture.

### NATION OBSERVES SAFETY WEEK

Safety is a year-around paying proposition, points out David G. Steinkne, safety specialist at Michigan State College, as farmers over the nation join this week in observing National Farm Safety Week.

Safety was being stressed this week in churches, in homes, on the highways, in the fields, with animals, with machinery, in every-day living.

The best part of Farm Safety Week, reminds Steinkne, is that it gives us all a little nudge to take inventory and make our surroundings safer. Safety pays before an accident — the farm pays afterwards, if he's around.

Farmers who keep their machinery away from their cattle herd are doing more than practicing good farmyard housekeeping. They may be preventing an outbreak of x-disease, or bovine hyperkeratosis, advises Dr. Frank Thorp, Jr., research veterinarian at MSC.

George Merriman, State Fair board member in charge of the sheep department, warns that there will be no temporary tents this year to take care of late combinations for the exhibits.



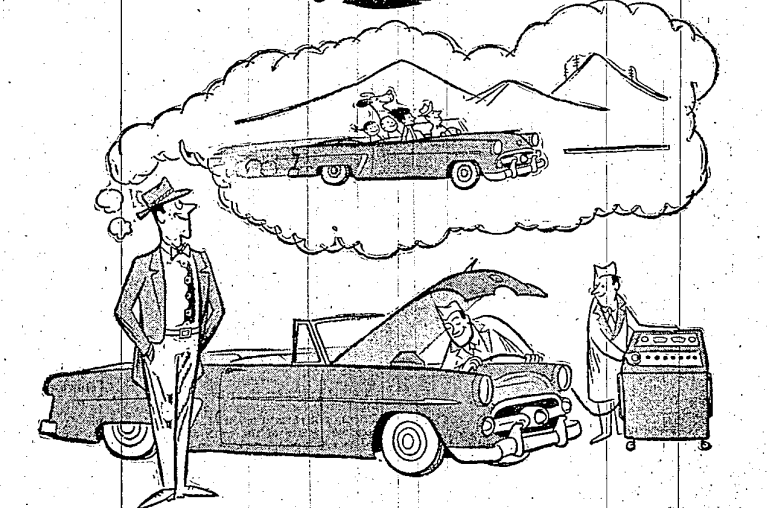

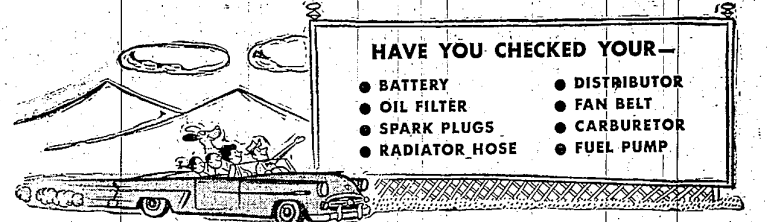
