For instance, the idea that foods spoil when left in opened cans has no foundation, points out Mrs. Hazel C. Amen, nutritionist at Michigan State College. In fact, she states that in some cases it may even be safer to store unused portions in the can in the refrigerator than to remove the contents to another container.

However, a refrigerator full of opened, partly filled tin cans doesn't represent very high housekeeping standards.

Any cans of unopened food with bulging ends, known as "swells," should be discarded, stresses Mrs. Amen.

The homemakers may be confused by grades of canned foods. Price differences are caused by differences in appearance, color, flavor, etc.

It may be more economical to purchase lower grades of canned foods for dishes where the original appearance of the food is unimportant — as in soups, creamed dishes, scalloped dishes and salads.

Higher grades are desirable when the food is to be served as it comes from the can — as in the case of stewed tomatoes or fruits for dessert.

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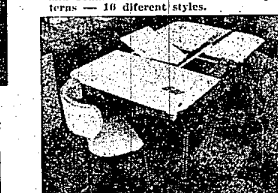
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
