## Archery Hunting Gains Popularity During 1952

Mushrooming interest in the sport of archery big game hunting took more than 28,500 persons afield in Michigan last fall and they shot nearly 1,550 deer, the conservation department reports.

Based on a 10 per cent poll of all licensed archers, the department survey showed 6.45 per cent of the archers were successful, somewhat fewer than the 7.2 per cent success chalked up in 1951.

License sales show that archery is fast becoming a highly popular Michigan sport. In 1947, license sales totaled 7,650. Since then, archer numbers have increased steadily and last year's total of license sales was 21 per cent above the 1951 figure.

## Record Set In Sale Of '52 Duck Stamps

More duck stamps were sold in Michigan last year than during any previous period since they were first sold in 1934, the conservation department notes.

An unofficial report shows that 136,000 of the migratory bird hunting stamps were sold from July 1, 1952, to June 30, 1953, a 13 per cent increase over the 1951-1952 sales.

During recent years, Michigan has ranked fourth, fifth or sixth nationally. Generally, California, Minnesota and Texas sell the most stamps, with Michigan, Wisconsin and Illinois down the list.

A post office report showing official national totals will be released this fall.

## Spot Redhead Ducks In Michigan Marsh

A brood of eight redhead ducklings, attended by their mother, has been found in the Crow Island marsh between Saginaw and Bay City, the conservation department reports.

Eugene Kenaga, an Audubon Society member from Midland, and Dr. Miles D. Pirnie, "waterfowl" specialist from Michigan State College, found the brood.

Dr. Pirnie says it's the first reported in Michigan in a number of years and the first found on an inland marsh, so far as records show.

Also, about 25 other redheads were seen in the marsh, though he emphasized that these were probably not nesters.
