LIVONIA COMPLETES CONSTRUCTION OF NEW BRIDGE

A new arch-type bridge which spans a branch of Rouge River at Anglin's Road has been completed by the Livonia Department of Public Works and is now open to traffic.

The bridge, located just north of Seven Mile Road on Anglin's, replaces a faulty one-lane bridge which previously created a traffic hazard.

Just under 100 feet long and spanning 24 feet from bank to bank, the bridge is constructed of corrugated steel which arches across the Rouge branch.

The road surface continues across the full length of the bridge, concealing it completely.

During construction of the new bridge, the Rouge channel was straightened to permit a better flow of water. Previously, water had been "backing up" at the point where the bridge crosses the channel. Grading operations continued throughout the week at the site as I.P.W. crews worked to raise the road surface to the level of the bridge.

The construction project began in June.

Make Delicious Desserts With Nonfat Dry Milk

If your youngsters won't drink their milk let them "eat" it. Nonfat dry milk contains all the qualities of fluid milk except the fat.

Therefore, when you use it in baking or in desserts, you are actually giving the children the valuable constituents of milk so essential to normal health and growth.

A one-pound package of nonfat dry milk, available at the grocers, will make five quarts of nonfat milk for as little as nine cents a quart.

Here are two dessert recipes, both of which will make them "eat" their milk and love it.

MARBLED BUTTERSCOTCH PUDDING (Makes 4 servings)

One 4-ounce package butterscotch pudding mix, 5 tablespoons nonfat dry milk, 1½ cups water, ½ cup water, ½ cup nonfat dry milk, ½ cup semisweet chocolate chips.

Blend pudding mix and 5 tablespoons nonfat dry milk powder in saucepan. Gradually stir in 1½ cups water until blended. Place over low heat and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Cool to lukewarm.

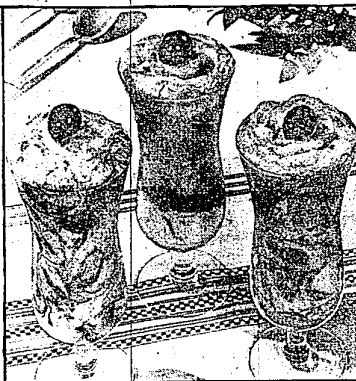
Pour ½ cup water into 1-quart bowl. Sprinkle ½ cup nonfat dry milk powder over surface of water. Beat with rotary beater or electric mixer until stiff (about 8 to 10 minutes). Fold into pudding. Stir in chocolate chips. Pour into 6 individual serving dishes. Chill.

APPLESAUCE TAPIOCA (Makes 4 to 6 servings)

One egg separated, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 cups liquefied nonfat dry milk, 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, 2 tablespoons sugar, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ cup sweetened applesauce, 2 tablespoons raisins, ¼ teaspoon cinnamon, ¼ teaspoon vanilla.

Beat egg white with rotary beater until foamy. Add sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time; continue to beat until mixture stands in soft peaks. Mix egg yolk with about ½ cup liquefied nonfat dry milk in top of double boiler. Add tapioca, sugar, salt and remaining liquefied nonfat dry milk.

Place over hot water and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Remove from heat. Pour a small

amount of the hot mixture over beaten egg white, blend quickly, then quickly stir in remaining tapioca mixture.

Add raisins, cinnamon and vanilla to applesauce; stir applesauce into tapioca mixture. Allow to cool at room temperature for 15 minutes. Stir and place in refrigerator to chill.

Note: To make liquefied nonfat dry milk, follow directions on the package.

NEW CHEMICALS HELP PREVENT MILDEW, ODORS

Certain chemicals can be used to help solve the problem of mildew caused by warm, moist air, explains Lucile Ketchum, home management extension specialist at Michigan State College.

Calcium chloride is the old standby. However, it breaks down as it absorbs moisture and must be replaced. It also creates the problem of a "drip," Miss Ketchum reports.

Newer chemicals available in most hardware stores, some notions departments and some drug stores are sold in bags and do not present the drip problem. These chemicals are sold under various names but your dealer should know what you want if you ask for the kind that doesn't drip.

These newer chemicals change color as they absorb moisture and can be reused if you dry them in the oven according to directions that come with them.

Stuffy odors which may also accompany moist, warm air present another summer problem to homemakers.

Drying out the house with heat or ventilation is the best answer. If the odor still persists, another chemical, chloride of lime, may help. It's a deodorant and disinfectant which may be sprinkled on basement floors and left until the musty odor disappears.

Then, sweep up the chemical, scrub and dry the floor.

Chloride of lime isn't suitable to use in contact with fabrics as it will cause them to deteriorate, cautions Miss Ketchum.
